Express solidarity with Soviet Jewry

Sunday, October 5 was a raw, bitter day. The weather, however, did not deter the large crowd that assembled at Strathcona Park and later marched to the Soviet Embassy to demonstrate their solidarity with their Russian Jewish brethren.

The rally was organized by Ruth Berger and Rabbi Basil Herring, Co-Chairmen of the Combined Soviet Jewry Committee.

This year's demonstration was of particular urgency because of the drastic cut down in Jewish emigration from the Soviet Union. In July, 1979, 4,068 people were allowed to leave; this year's figure was 1,205. Last August, 4,711 Jews left; the August, 1980 total was only 700, a drop of more than

80%. "Observers feel that there might be a complete shutdown of emigration by Jews and other minority groups in the U.S.S.R.," said Ruth Berger.

During the rally, Rabbi Herring told the Russians in the Embassy that "the Jews of Ottawa have not forgotten our co-religionists behind the Iron Curtain", and warned that the fight for their freedom would continue.

Rabbi Herring's words were echoed in the signs and placards carried by the demonstrators. "Let Me People Go", "We Stand together with the Jews of the U.S.S.R.", "Soviet Justice is a Joke". Perhaps the one that said it all in a few words was "Let Freedom In: Let Jews Out!"

Plan to encourage purchases of Bonds

The Ottawa Hebrew Free Loan Association will lend young adults of our community funds to enable them to purchase Israel Bonds, it was announced by William Grossman, President of the Ottawa Hebrew Free Loan Association. The Association is prepared to lend up to a total of \$10,000 for this purpose.

To encourage young married couples of our community to become partners in Israel through the purchase of State of Israel Bonds, Mr. Grossman said the Hebrew Free Loan Association is prepared to advance the equivalent of \$250 in U.S. funds to each purchaser. The amount borrowed is to be repaid within one year with postdated cheques.

The Bond purchased with the borrowed funds will be registered in the name of the purchaser and will be held by the Ottawa Hebrew Free Loan Association until repayment of

the borrowed amount is completed. In the interim, the Bond will be earning interest for the benefit of the purchaser.

In announcing the availability of funds Mr. Grossman stated "there are many young couples in our community who wish to help Israel but who find it difficult to pay \$250 out for the purchase of an Israel Bond. The payment of approximately \$25 a month over a one year period would allow these young couples to demonstrate their support and identify with Israel. By advancing the \$250 to complete the purchase the Ottawa Hebrew Free Loan Association will enable these young people to join with other Israel Bond purchasers in their support of the State".

Health and Fitness Fair

Impressive program planned Oct. 26 - 27

The major focus of the Second Annual Health and Fitness Fair, to be held at the Jewish Community Centre, on October 26 and October 27 will be fitness, health and nutrition according to the Chairman of the Planning Committee, Dr. Stanley Labov.

The keynote speaker will be Nathan Pritikin, Director of the Longevity Institute in Santa Monica, California. Mr. Pritikin's book entitled "The Pritikin Program for Diet and Exercise", has been on the best seller list for many months.

Dr. Wilbert Keon, Professor and Chairman of the Department of Surgery for the University of Ottawa, Chief of the Division of Cardio-Thoracic surgery at the Ottawa Civic Hospital, and Dr. J. Himms Hagen of Ottawa University, a noted biochemist in the field of fat metabolism will present a panel discussion

on the subject of nutrition, cardiac considerations, and fat metabolism.

The Fair will include a Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic on Monday, October 27 under the sponsorship of the Ottawa B'nai B'rith Lodges and Chapters. Celebrities will be at the clinic on Monday, including the C.F.R.A. Mobile.

The activities at the Fair on Monday will be geared to students from various public schools in the city. Over 1,000 school children are expected to participate.

The Fair will also include a variety of workshops including Miss Sally Olsen on non-competitive games; Dr. E. Hoffman on podiatry; Miss S. Borts on yoga; The Diabetic Association on exercise and diabetes; and child development by the Ottawa Carleton Regional Health Unit.

Over 36 non-profit voluntary organizations related to health, fitness and nutrition will be on hand. There will be preventative testing in many areas such as blood, vision and fitness.

The Fair is sponsored by the Jewish Community Centre of Ottawa in co-operation with the Ottawa Carleton Regional Health Unit. The Fair is open to the general public, free of charge. There is a charge of \$3.50 for Mr. Pritikin's evening address at 7:30 on October 26, plus a \$2.00 charge for a Pritikin-style breakfast held on Sunday morning at 10:00 a.m.

80-81 Series is off to good beginning

On Sunday evening, October 5, a capacity audience of over 300 people came to the Agudath Israel Synagogue to hear Professor Shlomo Avineri speak on the topic "Middle East Stalemate—Is There An Alternative?" This open public meeting was the first in the new "Forum 81" series, sponsored by the Community Relations — Canada Israel Committee of the Jewish Community Council, in co-operation with the Synagogues of Ottawa.

Last year, the Committee launched a number of public meetings under the general heading "Mid-East Update — the New Realities." The overwhelming response has led to an expansion of the program, which in addition to its original focus, will also address issues of broad general concern to the Jewish community.

Other topics to be discussed are, "The Revised Canadian Constitution — what about Minority Rights" and "Canada-Israel Relations at the U.N." Watch this Bulletin for dates and further announcements.

The Committee is also

planning a Community Relations Seminar at the Jewish Community Centre on Sunday, December 14 from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. It will deal in depth with three areas of Jewish concern: Canada-Israel relations today, Anti-Semitism and Neo-Nazism in Canada and the current status of World Jewry.

An informed panel of experts will lead the discussion. 1980 U.J.A. ALLOCATIONS

The September meeting of the Board of Trustees faced the difficult task of approving the allocations for the 1980 United Jewish Appeal campaign. The final figures will be published in the next issue of the Bulletin.

The process which was followed this year was somewhat different than in the past. Under the chairmanship of Joseph Lieff, our First Vice-President, the Planning, Budget and Allocations Committee began meetings early with a view to determining the prospective needs of the agencies for the 1980-81 fiscal year. The attempt was to move the budgeting process up by six months to facilitate forward budgeting for 1981-82.

That aim was by-and-large achieved. Hopefully, the budgeting and allocations process for the 1981-82 year will be completed by May or June of '81.

The problem faced by all of our beneficiary agencies was that while inflation was increasing, costs and demands for service were also increasing. The difficulty which the Allocations Committee had was that income had not kept pace with inflation; we had a flat campaign, a result not uncommon in Canada and one which has been with us for a few years.

In addition, as a result of a decision of the Board of Trustees, we welcomed one more agency into the family of beneficiaries: the Star of David Hebrew School.

The Committee met with each of the agencies at least once and in some instances twice. The budgets were scrutinized carefully and the representatives of those institutions answered many questions posed by the members of the committee. Following the hearings, the Committee reviewed all of the requests and came up with recommended allocations.

The individual recommendations were then discussed with each of the local agencies so that they would understand the rationale behind the decisions. The proposals were then forwarded to the Executive Committee and ultimately to the September meeting of the Board of Trustees.

In dealing with the allocation for our afternoon schools, a formula was developed which was based upon an allocation per pupil and the number of teaching hours. It was felt that by this approach, all of the afternoon schools would be treated on a more or less equal basis.

The problem came in deciding where cuts in allocations were to be made. After a good deal of deliberation, the Committee decided that three of the agencies, notably the Jewish Community Centre, the Talmud Torah Board and Hillel Lodge, have some capacity for generating supplementary funds on their own without endangering the philosophy of the one central campaign for communal needs, the United Jewish Appeal.

There was also the difficult decision to be made in reducing slightly our allocation to Israel and overseas relief, a reduction of approximately 1/2%. The Committee agonized over this decision and only accepted it on the understanding that any income over what had been projected would be used initially to restore this reduction.

At the September meeting, the Board of Trustees had a full discussion and a resolution was passed approving the recommendations of the Planning, Budget and Allocations Committee and the Executive.

The task of making allocations is not an enviable one; it requires the devotion of its members to the community, an understanding of the overall needs and a willingness to sit through many hours of meetings. Our community owes a debt of gratitude to this year's committee members: Joseph Lieff, Gerald Berger, Dr. Shier Berman, Dr. Baruch Diena, Alfred Friedman, Simone Goldberg, the late Gilbert Greenberg, Lorry Greenberg, Jack Krane, Issie Landau, Dr. Harvey Lithwick, Charles Merovitz, Dorothy Nadolny, Dr. Eli Rabin, Irving Rivers, Gdalyah Rosenfeld, Rabbi Irving Schreiber, Charles Taylor, Irving Taylor, Norman Zagerman, and the staff of the committee, Hy Hochberg and Samuel Asher. To all of them I extend the thanks of the community for a job well done, one in which all beneficiary agencies can feel that they were fairly and equitably treated.

There is only one way in which we can cure the problem of allocations and that is by a more successful U.J.A. Campaign in which every member of the community participates and bears his or her fair share. It is up to all of us, if we want the services, then we must be willing to pay the price.

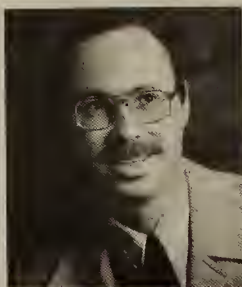

Charles Wiseman will serve as the Jewish Community Council's liaison officer for Leadership Development, according to an announcement by Sol Shinder, president of the organization. He succeeds to the post held by L. Gerald Levitz for the past three years.

The leadership development program which was established some fifteen years ago, covers a two-year span. A few of the present participants will form the nucleus of the 1980-82 group.

The role of the Leadership Development Group as set out in the Council's Constitution is to recruit young men and women with potential for communal leadership; to develop a program which will introduce participants to the needs and aspirations of the Jewish community; give them

Jewish Social Service

Agency of Ottawa-Carleton

Is there a need for a counselling program following marriage breakdown in the Ottawa Jewish community? The Jewish Social Services Agency decided to find out this summer with a six week workshop for separated and newly-divorced individuals. Linda Merali, a psychiatric social worker at the Royal Ottawa Hospital would serve as social animator if there was any response.

The response not only indicated a real need for such a program, but proved to be most beneficial to those 15 participants, primarily in their mid 30's (3 of whom were men — a large number states Merali who specializes in separation adjustment. The idea of the "happy bachelor who has no problems and leads a wild social life at singles bars" is slowly disappearing as men face the reality of their loneliness and turn to support groups for help as well.) Most of the 15 had custody of their children.

The participants were so pleased with the sessions that they asked for the workshops to be extended a further 3 weeks. The group's focus centred around the four stages of separation — denial, anger, depression and adjustment. Merali's role was to help each see the reality of his or her situation and to understand the emotions involved before they tried to work through them and accept themselves and the adjustments as positive moves.

Bitterness and a sense of failure — how could this happen to me? — were common reactions for all initially; the support group allowed them to express this anger which was often denied among friends and family. All had experienced a deep sense of loneliness and isolation from friends.

Merali said that in most instances of marriage breakdown the individuals have to gradually learn to distance themselves and move from the emotional upheaval to the impersonal business arrangements in their dealings with the estranged spouse. These business arrangements such as custody, visiting times and financial support combined with the frustration and humiliation of dealing with the legal system often combine to overwhelm the newly separated and deepen the inability to cope which increases the loss of self esteem. Each must come to assume greater responsibility and with responsibility comes a more positive outlook and increasing sense of worth.

By the end of the nine weeks, each was able to accept his or her situation and each had started seeking new concrete directions. The workshops enabled everyone to share emotions and experiences and to pick up on the suggestions of others who were sympathetic to their plight.

Merali was struck by this particular group's positive motivation and attitude of self-help. Most had tried marriage and/or individual counselling before separating, seriously considering all alternatives before finally terminating their marriages. This group was especially warm and shared a great deal more than she normally sees in support groups.

She felt that the warmth was in large part due to their Jewish identity which played an important part in the group's cohesion. The participants felt that it was important to be with other Jewish people in the same situation who could understand and discuss issues of a Jewish nature (such as synagogue activities being so family oriented and not socially comfortable for single parent situations). The Jewish environment made it easier for some to openly discuss specific problems with regard to children and the often overwhelming sense of guilt over the damage to the children living through a separation.

All agreed that the sessions had helped them seek new directions in their lives; all expressed the hope that the Jewish Social Services Agency would offer similar programs in the future for others in the same situation. Merali added that she would also like to see this program offered at least twice a year, but with wider advertising in the community.

New adult education courses on cassettes

An innovative and exciting new tool in Jewish adult education is now being made available by the Jewish People's University through a series of courses on Jewish subjects produced on cassettes.

The courses are on Yiddish and Hebrew literature, Jewish history, the American Jewish experience, and trends and problems of contemporary Jewish life in America, Israel and other parts of the world. They are geared for home listening and for use in adult classes or study-groups in schools, community centers and congregations, senior citizens clubs and other organizations.

Each course, given on a non-credit basis, consists of thirteen half-hour lectures. The lecturers are outstanding authorities on the respective subjects who are on the faculties of Touro College and its Herzliah-Jewish Teachers Seminary Division, of which the Jewish People's University is a part, and those of other institutions of higher learning.

The thirteen lectures of each course are contained in six cassettes, which are packed in a library-style album together with a study outline, reading list and instructions for use. So far eleven courses have been produced and two new courses are produced every three months.

Jan Peerce

The world-acclaimed operatic tenor, Jan Peerce, will appear in recital on Saturday, November 15, at 9:00. Tickets are \$9 (reserved) and \$7 (general admission).

Jan Peerce, this year celebrating half a century as America's favorite tenor with a gala concert/celebration at Carnegie Hall this December, has literally done it all.

At 76, Peerce still has a clear, strong tenor voice in the bel canto tradition, and his repertoire is enormous. In addition to his operatic roles, he performs German lieder, French contemporary songs, ballads, cantorial music, oratorios, and show-tunes with equal facility. He has been successful in night club acts, opera, concerts, film, television, and at age 67 made his Broadway debut appearing as Tevye in "Fiddler on the Roof." He has also performed in "The Rothschilds" and "Laugh a Little, Cry a Little," a revue written especially for the incomparable talents of this master showman.

Peerce's rise from the streets of New York's Lower East Side was long and hard. Born Jacob Pincus Perlmuth, he made his first money singing at the age of 11 in a synagogue, but during his early years earned his living as Pinky Pearl the violinist and band leader. It was Samuel "Roxy" Rothafel who discovered Jan's voice and hired him as a featured singer at the new Radio City Music Hall.

Peerce's first opera performance was in San Francisco. His success was so impressive that he was immediately engaged by the Metropolitan Opera. His memorable debut as Alfredo in "La Traviata" was hailed by critics, who proclaimed him the "all-American successor to the greats of opera's almost extinct 'Golden Age.'"

Peerce regularly sings in every part of the United States from New York to Los Angeles and is as familiar and popular in the small towns as he is on such national programs as the Merv Griffin Show, the Mike Douglas Show, and the Dinah Shore program. He recently made his second tour of Australia, where he gave 17 concerts in 21 days.

Particular highlights in his long and colorful international career which Jan cherishes are a dinner in his honor by Bonds for Israel, the presentation of its Tarbut (Culture) Medal by the America-Israel Cultural Foundation, and the presentation of the Mt. Scopus Award for years of devoted effort on behalf of Jewish people and the State of Israel, which was presented jointly to him and his wife on his recent trip to that country.

What is a Shaliach?

Many people in the Jewish community ask me the same question, "What is a Shaliach?" and after I try to explain that difficult word, I am asked another reasonable question, "Why does the Jewish community need a Shaliach?" Now after a year of experience, I am in a better position to answer.

Simply translated, a Shaliach is "a messenger" — a messenger from Israel, who brings a very special message about Israel to Jews in the Diaspora. The message concerns the special relationship between the Jewish community in Israel and the North American Jewish community.

The Israeli Jewish community as everyone knows, lives in a very small country in the Middle East. The land is poor and is surrounded by masses of enemies; it struggles constantly for its survival. On the other hand, the North American Jewish community struggles for its survival in terms of Jewish identity. It exists in a liberal, secular society that theoretically accepts every one.

It is easy to assimilate or be assimilated through moral support and money, i.e. U.J.A. and Israel, on the other hand provides a sense of pride to diaspora and a "home" for all Jews. Logically, these two parts of the world Jewish community help each other in a very simple way. The North American Jews (and all the other Jews of the diaspora as well) could solve their problem about Jewish identity, by making aliya to Israel (the only Jewish state) and helping to create a stronger Jewish state. But unfortunately, for a variety of reasons, this simple and clear solution is still a dream, and until this dream is realized we will leave the gates open by strengthening the connections between Israel and the diaspora.

The role of the Shaliach — my role — is to represent Israel, not as a subject for ritual prayer ("Next year in Jerusalem") or for the purpose of soliciting donations, both of which are important, but as a real option as a place for Jews to live, and as a source of Jewish identity and survival for Jews who live in the diaspora.

I accomplish this role in a number of ways:

Dror-Camp Geshet: Together with a group of young people, we are running a youth movement that emphasizes Israel as the central aspect of Jewish identity and encourages young people to consider Israel as a possibility for their future.

Programs in Israel: Helping people to take part in programs in Israel. These programs, including summer programs, Upan, university years in Israel, etc., are an excellent history and culture, and gives them a better understanding of Israel.

Chug Aliya: Mutual support and encouragement is provided for people who have already decided to make Aliya. The program creates opportunities for getting together in a group to discuss aspects of life in Israel, or to provide any other type of assistance.

Hebrew speaking group: Encourages people who are looking for a chance to practice their Hebrew by creating a group that gets together regularly to speak simple Hebrew.

Israel Programming: Assistance of any kind to the Jewish Community Centre, Jewish Student Union or any other Jewish organization which organizes programs connected with Israel. These (and the many others) are just a means for the Shaliach to remind you that Israel is really a serious option to consider as a place to live.

Finally, I would say that the Shaliach cannot work in a vacuum. He needs the support and co-operation of the community and especially of the people and organizations that really believe in the future of the Jewish community, and in the future of Israel as an important condition for the future of the Jewish community.

During my year in Ottawa I have received a lot of support from many individuals and organizations and I would like to thank them for their help. In the future I hope to continue and expand this co-operation. I would like to see more children and youth in Dror and Camp Geshet, more young and young people in programs in Israel and more programs about Israel in the Jewish Organizations and, despite all the difficulties, more Aliyah.

Historian to speak at Temple Israel

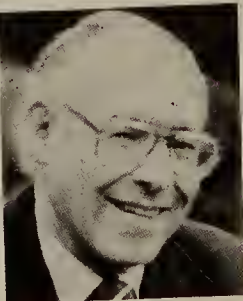
