Security and Antisemitism

The need for securing our community and staying vigilant is ever-growing. Antisemitic incidents in Virginia are up 225% compared to 2020 according to recent ADL statistics. Many additional incidents go unreported or happen under the radar at community events, schools and individual homes.

This past year Federation applied for and was awarded a \$200,000 Tepper Foundation Security Grant that was distributed to support security personnel at early childhood programs at our community pre-schools, day camps and after-school programs. These funds not only provide security but also offer budgetary relief to our partners so they can continue their missions serving local families.

This is in addition to more than \$500,000 invested by Federation in security over the past 6 years. Those dollars enabled our Regional Security Advisor to train more than 1,000 individuals in just the past year, both Jewish and non-Jewish, in Situational Awareness, Active Threat Response, and other vital security measures. Our investment also sustains our partnership with the national Secure Community Network (SCN) to enhance our community's safety, security and preparedness.

Additionally, our Jewish Community Relations Committee continues to advocate our local and national elected leaders about security funding and other pressing issues that affect our community daily.

Jewish Connectivity, Identity & Engagement

A recent Pulse Survey of the Richmond Jewish community commissioned by Federation and with support from the Sisisky family, not only revealed a growing desire for Jewish connection and engagement, but also a need for new ways to accomplish it. For Federation, it's a call to create innovative ways to meet the community's need to deepen connections and strengthen identity in safe places. While traditional gatherings at synagogues and programs at our partner institutions meet the needs of many, other Jewish Richmonders are searching for more intimate, less formal gatherings to seek solidarity, support, and a renewed sense of identity.



Federation is meeting this moment by creating and funding inclusive and increased programming. From inventive PJ Library programs and NextGen Shabbats, to ENRICH FOR LIFE and Senior Schmooze, which address social isolation by providing older adults (Jewish and non-Jewish) a free and safe place to meet and make connections, Federation is focused on supporting community-wide opportunities that are friendly and inspiring.

Israel and Overseas

Jewish Community Federation of Richmond continues to support our Israeli brothers and sisters rebuild their lives even as the situation in Israel remains unsettled. In addition to our long-time Partnership2Gether sister city, Hadera, Federation has launched a partnership with the northern city of Shlomi, which is located near the Lebanese border. We have undertaken a three-year rebuilding plan there with our partners at the Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI) and our friends at Jewish Peninsula. Already, the Nachalim School of 100 students on the autism spectrum, ages 6-21, has installed safe rooms in every classroom and several small businesses are starting or rebuilding thanks to our community's generosity.



Overseas, our sister city of Zaporozhe, Ukraine, is besieged with its 5th year of war marked by ongoing missile strikes including recent damage at the local Mazel Tov JCC. Along with our JDC partners, we continue to provide critical support for the community. Their resiliency continues to astonish, even celebrating Jewish holidays via Zoom.

Jewish Education

Federation sustains the core value of education in the Jewish community. From scholarships at the Aleph Bet Preschool and Rudlin Torah Academy to supporting the VCU Center for Judaic Studies annual Lyons Lecture, Federation provides learning opportunities appropriate for all ages.

PJ Library sends free high-quality Jewish children's books to 457 families every month and lends to community partners. Federation hosted multiple programs addressing topics such as antisemitism on campus, media bias, and adding to the dialogue, the JCRC launched a highly attended book club.

Jewish high school and college students continue to face a challenging environment on campuses requiring Federation programming support for BBYO, Hillels throughout the state and Jewish Life at VCU.

Jewish Caring

Jewish Federation cares for the most vulnerable in our community. With our partners at JFS and Richmond Jewish Foundation, together we have served 435 Jewish families and individuals in crisis over the past 7 years through the Richmond Jewish Care Line, providing mental health services, short-term financial assistance, and counseling to help them stabilize their lives.

We also create an inclusive community by supporting Friendship Circle, that enables people with disabilities develop friendships through meaningful social experiences at home and in community-wide activities. For several years we have also supported and participated in Dignity Grows, a national organization addressing period poverty, by providing free hygiene products in the Richmond area. Dozens of volunteers enthusiastically packed 3000+ bags which were distributed across Greater Richmond.

Jewish Leadership

Federation supports multiple initiatives designed to develop essential skills for those who commit to take on leadership roles within Jewish Richmond and the greater Richmond community. The reimagined Community Leadership Institute, in its second year, is open to all young professionals between the ages of 22-45. It explores the structure of Jewish Richmond, creates networking opportunities for young professionals, and provides elite professional development opportunities for participants.

Additionally, Federation supports several youth-oriented programs such as BBYO and Hillels, which offer leadership opportunities for teens and young adults as they develop into engaged community members. We could not succeed in our mission without hundreds of Jewish Richmonders both professionals and volunteers, who have taken on leadership roles at Federation and in our community at agencies, synagogues, schools, and more.

Cultural Exchange and Outreach

Federation builds bridges with secular and non-Jewish faith-based organizations and individuals. We know that only by working together can we improve the lives of all members of our community.

This year we co-partnered with Virginia Union University to launch the 1st VUU Interfaith Seder, bringing together over 200 members of the Jewish and African American communities to create mutual understanding and appreciation.

We annually contribute to holiday toy drives and seek out activities and conversations with community leaders to be interwoven into the daily lives of all Richmonders.
