Year in Review

A Year of Growth, Partnership, and Purpose

As another fiscal year comes to a close, we find ourselves reflecting on a year defined by growth, resilience, and an unwavering commitment to Jewish life across New Hampshire. Together, we strengthened our Federation, expanded our reach, and deepened our partnerships, all while navigating a world that continues to present both challenges and opportunities for our community.

This year has reminded us that Federation is far more than an organization. It is a statewide network of people who care deeply about one another and believe that every Jew in New Hampshire deserves to feel connected, supported, and proud of who they are. That mission has guided every decision we've made this year and has inspired remarkable progress throughout our state.

None of this would have been possible without the incredible dedication of our Board of Directors, Foundation Trustees, committee members, volunteers, donors, partner organizations, congregations, and staff. Whether making phone calls during Super Sunday, welcoming families to a PJ Library event, attending the New Hampshire Jewish Film Festival, advocating for our community at the State House, or making a gift to the Annual Campaign, every act of participation helped strengthen Jewish life across New Hampshire.

This past year, Federation focused on creating meaningful impact where it matters most. Thousands of community members participated in programs that educated, inspired, and connected people of every age. At the same time, Federation strengthened its role as the statewide voice of New Hampshire's Jewish community. We expanded our advocacy efforts by building relationships with elected officials, educators, law enforcement, and interfaith partners while working to address the rise in antisemitism through education, community engagement, and strategic collaboration. We continued to deepen our connection with Israel through cultural programming, educational opportunities, and the exciting addition of our new community shaliach, whose arrival marks an important investment in strengthening the bonds between New Hampshire and Israel for years to come.

Our impact extended beyond programs alone. This year's Annual Campaign exceeded its fundraising goal thanks to the extraordinary generosity of our donors, ensuring that Federation can continue investing in security, education, advocacy, leadership development, and community-building initiatives throughout the Granite State. Every contribution—regardless of size—helps strengthen Jewish life today while laying the foundation for tomorrow.

As we look ahead, we do so with tremendous optimism. The relationships we've built, the partnerships we've strengthened, and the momentum we've created over the past year are only the beginning. A Note to Our Community About This Reissued Annual Report

The Jewish Federation of New Hampshire is reissuing this year's Annual Report because the original version contained several significant errors. Most seriously, a number of donors were listed at incorrect giving levels, duplicated, or omitted from the Honor Roll entirely. The report also included outdated or inaccurate information regarding members of our community's clergy and the Foundation Board of Trustees.

We recognize that an Annual Report is more than a collection of names and figures. It is a public record of the people whose generosity, leadership, and service strengthen Jewish life across New Hampshire. When someone's contribution or role is represented incorrectly—or not acknowledged at all—it can cause real hurt and undermine the trust our community places in us. We sincerely apologize to everyone who was misrepresented in the original publication.

JFNH takes responsibility for ensuring that the materials we publish are accurate. Although some of these errors occurred during the design and production process, the final report was reviewed and approved by us before printing. We should have identified the discrepancies before the report was distributed, and we regret that we did not.

This corrected edition includes the following updates:

- The heading "2026–27 Proposed Slate of

Officers" has been corrected to "2026–27 Board Nominees."

- The list of rabbis and other clergy serving community congregations has been updated to reflect the correct individuals.
- The 2025–26 Foundation Board of Trustees has been replaced with the accurate and complete roster.
- The Honor Roll of donors has been fully revised using the original source records so that donors are listed accurately, in the correct giving categories, and without unintended omissions or duplication.

We are especially mindful of the impact these errors had on our donors and community leaders. Their generosity and service deserve to be recognized accurately and respectfully. Reissuing the Annual Report is an important step toward correcting the public record, but we understand that a corrected publication does not erase the frustration or disappointment caused by the original errors.

We are reviewing our proofing and production procedures to ensure that future publications include stronger safeguards for verifying names, titles, leadership roles, and donor recognition information. We are grateful for the patience and understanding of our community as we work to correct these mistakes and restore confidence in the accuracy of our publications.

Foundation Report

Jewish Federation of New Hampshire Foundation: 2025-26 Fiscal Year Recap

On behalf of the JFNH Foundation Trustees, we present the following summary of the performance of the Foundation's assets for the fiscal year 2025-26.

The Foundation began the fiscal year on July 1, 2025, with almost \$4.9 million in assets, and concluded the fiscal year on June 30, 2026, with over \$5.6 million in assets. During the fiscal year, the Foundation distributed over \$150 thousand to support programming, activities, initiatives, and operations in furtherance of JFNH's mission.

Thanks to generous donors during this period, three new endowed funds were established. In addition, we received contributions to pre-existing funds. Together, these additions to our endowment exceeded \$35 thousand.

The Foundation's assets are managed by Evanson Asset Management (EAM), an advisor that specializes in index and passive management and had approximately \$5.9 billion under management as of March 2026. EAM derives its investment strategy from academic research and makes use of passive portfolios from Dimensional Fund Advisors (DFA) and Vanguard ETF index funds, among other investments. The Foundation pays \$750 per quarter to EAM for its services. EAM has been fully managing the Foundation's assets since February 2023.

For the fourth fiscal year in a row, JFNH's withdrawals from the Foundation were under budget. Thank you to JFNH Treasurer Rich LeSavoy and the Finance Committee, Executive Director Erik Martin and Finance Manager Tina Lemay for their continued careful management of JFNH's resources.

In addition to managing lifetime gifts to the JFNH endowment, the Foundation Trustees work with donors to include JFNH in their estate plans to ensure a lasting impact beyond their lifetimes. We strongly encourage our NH Jewish community members to consider making a planned gift to the JFNH endowment. Every planned gift made through a Will, Trust, or Beneficiary Designation form provides a permanent source of funding that sustains our vital programs, combats antisemitism, and preserves our heritage and values.

Alyse Bettinger – Congregation Ahavas Achim, Keene

Alyse Bettinger was raised in Howard Beach, New York. She spent more than a decade as a camper and senior staff member at Camp Edward Isaacs, a Jewish sleep away camp. There she built lifelong friendships and a strong sense of Jewish Pride. Alyse attended college at SUNY, Stony Brook followed by earning a professional degree in Occupational Therapy. Her family includes her husband Dr. Paul Bettinger and their 3 children, Josh, Ethan and Tami. The Bettinger family moved to Keene, New Hampshire in 1988. Alyse's career with Congregation Ahavas Achim began with helping to start a parent child pre-school play group. Next, she became involved with our Bagel Breakfast Fundraising for the Religious School. CAA has to keep up with Alyse! She independently takes on leadership roles in so many areas of CAA. Alyse is a long time member of our Synagogue Board. In 2015, Alyse was on our first Affiliation Committee and was selected again for the Affiliation Committee this year. As a member and now chair of the Membership Committee, she developed and implemented our Shmooze and Brews program which has been a huge success in bringing members of the synagogue together. She has worked continuously on ways to increase our membership by promoting connections with young adults who grew up in our Jewish Community. She encouraged them to consider lifelong engagement and involvement in our Jewish Community. Alyse has been instrumental in thinking about ways to bring in new members, especially in the area of Associate Members. She is very involved in creating and promoting events for our synagogue programming. Alyse continues to be a strong advocate for programming about Israel. When she noticed that we didn't have a program for Israel's Independence Day, Alyse set in motion the "Taste of Israel" program. In addition to program development, she has established a notebook with detailed information about each event to facilitate others to take over an event. Alyse worked on a survey to gather information about the interests of our membership. Her team created the "Getting to Know You" Survey. She was a key player in the synagogue flood remediation process as well as putting everything away when remediation was completed. She continues to lead in organizing the synagogue building, especially the kitchen. She is committed to making CAA an organization that facilitates bringing our wider Jewish Community together. In addition to her synagogue commitments, Alyse worked as an Occupational Therapist in rehabilitation centers and nursing homes. In her role as an Occupational Therapist, she worked with residents to maximize their independence in daily living through adaptive techniques, environmental modifications and supportive positioning. Through her professional experience, she developed a strong ability to meet people where they are by recognizing their individual needs and strengths and adapting tasks and environments to help them participate fully and confidently in community life. Milt and Kristina Zweig – Etz Hayim Synagogue, Derry

Having joined Etz Hayim Synagogue in 2022, Milt & Kristina Zweig have made a remarkable impact in their relatively short time at Etz Hayim, injecting new vitality and dynamic leadership into the community. Milt soon joined the Ritual Committee and was especially impactful on Yom HaShoah, sharing his family's story of survival in Nazi Germany. Milt has spent years researching his roots and recently reclaimed the German citizenship which had been stripped from his parents. To further honor their legacy, Milt is Founder and Director of the Zweig Foundation, a non-profit organization for the advancement of Holocaust education among the younger generation. Milt joined the Board of Directors in 2025, filling the vacant Secretary position and then began serving as President in June 2025. On a mission to improve the aesthetics of our 18-year-old building, Milt cultivated donations from members to upgrade our classrooms, library and foyer. Milt also has taken a direct role in finding a stream of transitional and visiting spiritual leaders while the search committee seeks a permanent Rabbi. Milt serves on the Board of the Jewish Federation of NH; and when he's not volunteering, he still finds time for his dental profession with Haas Dental Associates. Kristina's contributions have been equally impactful. She served for a year as the synagogue's office administrator, then moved into the Board Secretary role when Milt became President. She also manages the online calendar and has initiated and filled a variety of roles. Last fall, Kristina assembled High Holy Day gift bags, and she and Milt drove door-to-door to deliver symbolic foods of the holiday, including her homemade mini honey cakes. Additionally, Kristina has become our primary interior designer, using her creative energy to transform our classrooms, library, and lobby—painting, furnishing, and decorating each space to create an environment and vibe for each unique space. Kristina's innovative spirit continued as she took on the role of director of this year Purim spiel, Chaos in the Shul: The Shul with no Rabbi—a hilarious parody that poked fun at Etz Hayim during this past year of transition. She also baked hundreds of hamantaschen and organized a pre-spiel wine-and-cheese event, complete with fun, food, crafts, and a costume parade for the little ones. Milt and Kristina live in Sandown with their three dogs and two cats and have four adult children. They love to travel abroad and visit Europe frequently.

In the community, Ellie worked for 21 years as a librarian at Memorial School in Bedford, NH. After her retirement, she volunteered for 5 years at Rogers Memorial Library in Hudson, NH. Ellie has contributed in many ways to our synagogue, to the local community and to the wider Jewish community. She has earned the Crown of a Good Name.

Rebecca Sky – Temple Israel, Manchester

Rebecca Sky has devoted her professional life and her Jewish life to strengthening communities, uplifting others, and building institutions that care for people. She recently retired as the Executive Director of the New Hampshire State Commission on Aging, where she served from its inception in 2020 through May 2025. A respected public health leader with more than twenty-five years of experience, Rebecca has worked across New Hampshire to expand access to care, advance health equity, and support the wellbeing of older adults. Prior to her state service, she spent many years at the Foundation for Healthy Communities, where she helped hospitals increase access to treatment for people with Opioid Use Disorders, established evidence-based falls-prevention programs, and co-led the creation of the NH Health & Equity Partnership. Rebecca's commitment to Jewish communal life runs just as deep. Early in her career, she worked for the Jewish Federation of Austin as a campaign and community relations associate, and after moving to New Hampshire in the mid-1990s, she served on the NH Federation Board. She volunteers at Temple Israel on the Kitchen Krew, chairs the rabbi search committee, is facilitating the silent auction..., and generally tries to pitch in when she sees a need. She often credits attending Ramah Family Camp more than twenty years ago as a turning point that inspired her to weave Jewish life more intentionally into her home and to engage more fully in the broader kehillah. Rebecca holds a B.S. in Health Policy and Administration from Penn State University, an MPH from the University of New Hampshire, and a certificate in Value-Based Health Care from The Dartmouth Institute. She is a past officer of the New Hampshire Public Health Association. Born and raised outside Philadelphia as one of ten children, Rebecca and her husband David are the proud parents of Jedidiah and Benjamin. Temple Israel is fortunate to benefit from her wisdom, compassion, and steady leadership. Her dedication to service—both professional and Jewish—embodies the very spirit of the Shem Tov Award.

Through the Nixon Scholars-in-Residence Program, which she established with her late husband, Dr. Daniel Nixon, generations of Dartmouth students and community members have had the opportunity to engage with distinguished Jewish scholars and thought leaders.

Tamara has also been a devoted leader within the Upper Valley Jewish Community (Kol Ha'Emek), where she has helped strengthen relationships between the local congregation and Hillel at Dartmouth while providing thoughtful guidance on endowment and development efforts. Known for her personal touch—including handwritten thank-you notes to supporters—she exemplifies the values of generosity, humility, and community.

Whether helping steward charitable investments, mentoring future Jewish leaders, or quietly working behind the scenes to ensure Jewish institutions thrive, Tamara Nixon has left an enduring mark on the Jewish communities she serves.
