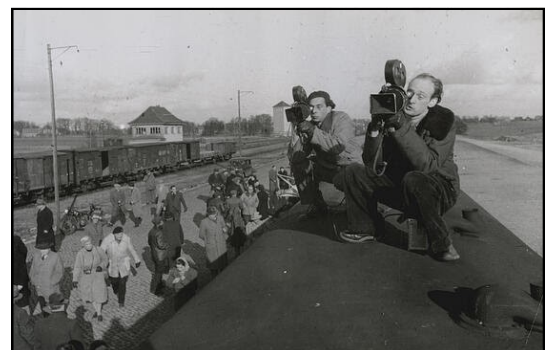

**A Tale of Two Worlds (1941)** is a promotional film outlining JDC's response to the Nazi advance in Europe, showing aid to refugees around the world. Spanning the globe through eye-witness accounts, the film addresses the situation of Jews across Europe including Germany, Austria, Czechoslovakia, France, Belgium, Holland, Denmark, Poland, Lithuania, and Portugal, as well as in Palestine, Shanghai, and Latin America, while highlighting JDC's work in partnership with other agencies.

**A Day of Deliverance (1949)** provides an overview of JDC activities on immigration, aid and assistance to displaced Jews in the late 1940s in parts of Europe, North Africa and the Middle East. The film includes rare footage of Holocaust survivors from the Bergen Belsen DP camp departing Germany, Yemenite Jews living in Aden, and detainees leaving the Cyprus detention camps, all traveling to the newly formed State of Israel.

The screening will be followed by a Q&A with Linda Levi, Director of JDC's Global Archives

# HUMAN SERVICES RELIEF MATCHING FUND

## Federation's Matching Funds Program Q & A

Thank you for your donations, pledges, and your questions.

### What is the Human Services Matching Funds Program?

The goal is to increase funds dedicated to Human Services through increased donations or pledges that are matched on a 1:2 basis.

### Does our Federation really receive a 50% "match" for every dollar raised for the Human Service Matching Funds Program?

Yes, qualifying pledges or donations will be matched on a 1:2 basis. \$10 equals \$15; \$100 equals \$150; \$1,000 equals \$1500.

### What is a qualifying pledge or donation for the match?

There are several ways for the pledge or donation to be matched.

If you pledged to the 2020 Campaign, by donating or pledging an additional amount and designating it for the Human Services Relief Fund.

If you pledged in 2020, and increase your 2021 pledge, the amount of the increase will be matched.

If you have not pledged for 18 months, the entire pledge will be matched.

### When does this matching program end?

December 31, 2020 is the deadline. All pledges or donations must be received by that date.

### How much matching funds are available?

If we raise \$50,000 for the Human Services Matching Funds Program, we will receive \$25,000.

### Why was the Human Services Matching Funds Program created?

Jewish Federations of North America (JFNA) recognized the need to increase funding for human services endeavors to support Jews in need within each Federation community. Thus, JFNA created the Human Services Matching Funds Program to provide each community the opportunity supplement funds raised through the 1:2 Match.

### Who is funding the match?

Maimonides Fund; Charles and Lynn Schusterman Family Foundation; Crown Family Philanthropies; Jack, Joseph & Morton Mandel Foundation, Singer Family Foundation, and Jewish Federations of North America.

## OVERSEAS PARTNERS—THE JEWISH AGENCY



### 166 Young Brazilians and Ukrainians Arrive in Israel

In two special flights organized by The Jewish Agency, a cohort of young people from the two countries arrived in Israel. They will participate in pre-Aliyah educational programs, studying and exploring life in the Jewish state. During the first week of November 2020, 120 young Ukrainians and 46 young Brazilians arrived in Israel, despite the logistical challenges due to the coronavirus pandemic. The Ukrainian cohort, which arrived late Tuesday, November 3, 2020, will soon embark on their studies in Israel. Their arrival was made possible by Dutch organization Christians for Israel (C4I) with assistance from Keren Hayesod.

“We live in special times. As ‘Christians for Israel,’ we are here to support the Jewish people. And we see it happening today: 120 young people are returning to their homeland, Israel!” said C4I CEO Frank van Oordt, who accompanied the young adults on the flight from Ukraine to Israel. C4I chose to sponsor this flight as part of its 40th anniversary celebration. A C4I delegation flew to Kiev to accompany the young Ukrainians on their journey to Israel. Dmitry Ioffe, the Jewish Agency *Shaliach* (Israeli emissary) to Ukraine, flew with them as well.

Sam Grundweg, Keren Hayesod’s World Chairman, who assisted in the efforts to bring the young people to Israel, said, “Keren Hayesod and the State of Israel face a significant task of immigration and absorption of Jews, who come from all over the world to build a home in Israel. The flight joins the many efforts of Israel, together with Christians for Israel, our true friends, who repeatedly demonstrate solidarity with Israeli society. We will continue to work together to advance important social goals.”

The new arrivals who are high school age will enroll in the Naale Elite Academy, a program backed by the Ministry of Education and the Naale Administration, which enables young Jews from around the world to complete high school in Israel. And those age 17-21 will enroll in the Selah program, a Jewish Agency initiative for high school graduates from the Former Soviet Union who plan to continue their higher education in Israel, run in partnership with the Israel Experience. All new arrivals were required to enter quarantine, in adherence with Ministry of Health guidelines.

Earlier that same week, young people arriving from Brazil said goodbye to their parents in order to begin their studies in Israel at Naale. They were accompanied on their flight from South America by Nestor Kirchuk, the Jewish Agency *Shaliach* to Brazil. These teens arrived as part of a growing trend of increased interest in Aliyah from Brazil, with The Jewish Agency reporting 800 new Aliyah files from that country opened since the beginning of 2020, a 21-percent rise from last year. The number of Naale participants from Brazil has doubled from last year.

A large percentage of these educational program graduates choose to stay in Israel, with many going on to serve in the Israel Defense Forces and study in Israeli colleges. Many parents of Naale and Selah participants follow their children to Israel and make Aliyah. “These days, it is especially moving to welcome these young people who are looking to build their future together with us here in Israel,” said Jewish Agency CEO and Director General Amira Ahronoviz. “The Jewish Agency will continue to fulfill its mission to bridge between world Jewry and Israel and to strengthen the connection with young Jews around the world.”



# SAGE NOTES

Good news always goes a long way. With thanks to the Hanson Family Fund, the Morse/Morgan Family Fund, and the Lisa and Steve Stone Family Fund of the Community Foundation of the Land of Lincoln, Federation on behalf of the Rosenwald Initiative received seed funding for a mural depicting Springfield-born Jewish philanthropist Julius Rosenwald. Federation had submitted its application for this grant in early September. The mural will be placed on the parking ramp at Seventh and Capitol across from the Rosenwald Home located at the Lincoln Historic Park site. We are forever grateful to Downtown Parking Springfield, Inc., whose president is Harry Stern, for donating the space.

It was four years ago in December that we began to put together what we now call the “Rosenwald Initiative.” Our goal was to co-host the Rosenwald Documentary with organizations in the Black community at a location befitting the occasion. The idea evolved from conversations between Rabbi Datz, Rabbi Marks, Jay Mogergerman, Betsy Salus, Natalie Silverman and Steve Stone, a joint venture of sorts, between the Education and Culture Committee and Jewish Community Relations Council. We previewed the film several times as we reached out to potential partners primarily within the Black community. In the process, we connected with the Lincoln Home National Historic Park historian Tim Townsend, and Mike Jackson, an architect-historian fervently dedicated to making Julius Rosenwald’s works more widely known. Eight months later, the Rosenwald Initiative sponsored the screening of the Rosenwald Documentary at Union Baptist Church attended by more than 700 people.

The Rosenwald Initiative gives new meaning to “unintended consequences.” We had no idea when we started that the Initiative would continue to meet, nor that we would show the movie *Strange Fruit*, that the National Park Service would dedicate the Rosenwald Home, nor that we would be on our way to commissioning a mural depicting Julius Rosenwald. The Rosenwald Initiative is not a formal organization, it is made up of people who care deeply about Springfield, the connections between our communities, and recognizing Julius Rosenwald as one of our country’s pioneer social philanthropists. We at Federation are proud to serve as the conveners of the Rosenwald Initiative.

Our experience with the Rosenwald Initiative showed us that charting unknown territory does have its benefits. Looking back at the past year, it was at first difficult to figure out our path. When we did our first Zoom program, partnering with Temple B’rith Sholom and Temple Israel, it was scary and intimidating. We were able to test zoom, thanks to David Radwine and his informative and enjoyable demonstration of perfect for Passover, flourless chocolate cake, followed by a mini-Seder for the community. Zoom would become a primary means for meetings, for bringing our community together, and would give us access to opportunities and partnerships unlike anything before.

We are making the best of our situation and are still adjusting, trying to find our way, learning as we go. I am grateful to our Board, our Federation staff and our volunteers who have remained dedicated to Federation’s mission through these difficult and unprecedented times.

*May the lights of Chanukah shine bright for all of us.*
