PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



I write this month's article having just returned yesterday from the Jewish Federation of North America's (JFNA) annual General Assembly (GA). Literally thousands of Jewish volunteers and professionals from all across North America, and indeed from around the world, attend. This is the third year in a row that I have attended, and as is always the case, it was well worth the time and travel.

As President I am regularly aware of what JFNA accomplishes all over the world. But the GA is an opportunity to really see the reach of what we in Springfield are a part of and contribute to. Each month I write that what we do in our own local Federation not only helps Jews in Springfield, but also nationally, in Israel, and around the globe. During this GA a stark example of that was the physical and financial help the city of Houston received through JFNA. I heard two separate presentations by members of Houston's Jewish community. Even though we all saw the pictures and watched the videos it's difficult to realize the destruction and devastation that Houston endured and continues to endure. Hundreds of Jewish families were among those Houstonians who lost their homes and virtually all of their possessions. Synagogues and Jewish Community Centers also were greatly damaged. Immediately, JFNA was on the scene with financial help for these victims. JFNA Professionals and volunteers from all across the country were physically on the scene as well. To listen to the tales of the flood victims sent shivers through me. Listening to these victims talk about the specific ways in which JFNA and your donations helped also sent shivers through me. It is the most recent example, and perhaps one of the closest, but Houston is just one example of what we all are part of, and what we should all be proud of.

One of the biggest differences between this GA and the two previous GA's I attended was the obvious distinct lack of American and international politics in the program and in discussions. JFNA's President, Richard Sandler, has worked hard to bring focus back to the mission of JFNA, and not on issues that may divide us. In one workshop I attended it was suggested that divisive issues cannot be ignored, and that Federation certainly has a role to play. That role – and it is an important one – is that of convener. When there are issues that divide Federation needs to convene discussions to ensure that all sides get to be heard, and that all sides listen to each other. It is vital that everybody believes that their perspective is not only appreciated but respected. However, all must remember that the mission of Federation is to help the Jewish people throughout the world. We can disagree regularly but we cannot allow disagreements to get in the way of that mission. Personally, I found the lack of divisive political discussions at this year's GA to be refreshing. I believe this will help us all to be more focused on the important work JFNA does.

I hope that some day more of us in our community will have the opportunity to attend a GA. It's hard to explain the vibrancy and vitality that is experienced while there. In the meantime, take my word for it: we in the Jewish Federation of Springfield are part of something special.

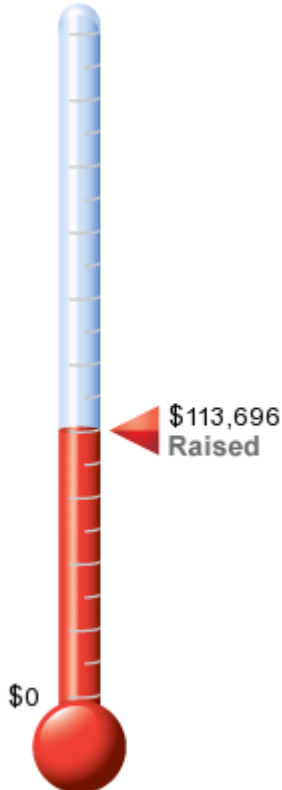

Why JCRCs Matter

The Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC) is a fixture in Springfield's Jewish communal life. Interestingly, nationally, over the past two decades not all communities have invested in JCRCs. However, as reported by David Bernstein, CEO of the Jewish Council for Public Affairs, and Rabbi Doug Kahn, of Broad Tent Consulting, "Community relations is once again on the rise."

Mr. Bernstein and Rabbi Kahn explain it this way:

"For many years, the Jewish community relations field was perceived to be on the decline. Jewish Federations, with some notable exceptions, reduced their community relations budgets and, in a few cases scrapped their JCRCs altogether. There were many reasons for this trend at the time, not least a general turn inwards to deal with the Jewish continuity crises and the likelihood of peace between Israel and the Palestinians. But it's hard to argue that in today's tumultuous political environment, local Jewish communities shouldn't be maximally externally leveraged and well connected to centers of leadership and power in their broader communities.

Indeed, for the first time in two decades, Federations that had previously cut their JCRC's are now re-investing. Some smaller Jewish communities with no history of community relations are also developing a community relations program. Community relations is once again on the rise.

We know of at least ten Jewish communities that are in re-building mode: Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; Stamford, Connecticut; Phoenix, Arizona; Seattle, Washington; Orange County, California; York and Reading, Pennsylvania; and Atlanta, Georgia. These include Jewish communities ranging in size from 700 to more than 100,000.

We at the Jewish Council for Public Affairs (JCPA) wanted to understand what led to this positive trend and what lessons might be gleaned from the diverse array of Jewish communities that made this decision.

So we asked Rabbi Doug Kahn, Executive Director emeritus of the San Francisco JCRC, to interview the lay and staff leaders of these JCRCs and Federations and put together a portrait of this phenomenon. What we learned is that while there is no single catalyst for the creation or re-establishment of these JCRCs, all are attuned to significant changes in the external environment. The most common rationales are:

A deep concern about the declining cohesion and increased polarization within the Jewish community and a belief that an effective JCRC could build bridges within as well as beyond the Jewish community;

A sense of urgency about growing anti-Semitism, hate and racism in American society and the need to build coalitions to address these challenges;

A need generally to have a larger Jewish communal voice on public affairs issues of concern to the community and a collective voice to respond to specific local issues;

A recognition that no table exists around which to bring together the disparate voices of the organized Jewish community – including to address local issues;

Growing awareness of the importance of forging closer relations with major minority groups in American society (e.g., African-American and Latino Americans), to find common ground on issues of mutual concern and to forestall increased anti-Israel sentiment;

Increased awareness about the importance and value of JCRC government relations work in identifying public resources for Jewish social service agencies.

While the form of the JCRCs varies widely (committees of federations, independent, an initiative of a Board of Rabbis, sponsored initially under a JCC), the mission and mandate are generally similar across the new JCRC communities - to advance the public affairs agenda of the Jewish community through consensus, coalitions, civil discourse and high-impact activism. The scope of priorities and issues also varies depending on the nature of challenges faced by and the level of consensus within each community."

We, in Springfield, are truly fortunate to have a dedicated and vibrant JCRC and to be a part of a what is right about the Jewish community relations field. I feel we set the example which many other communities would do well to emulate. We are visible within the Jewish community and the external Springfield community. We are deliberative in our actions and we are a force for positive change. This should be a source of pride for all of us and I encourage each of you to participate fully in JCRCs initiatives and activities.

Muguleta: From Crisis To Confidence

“Why are we leaving?” “Where are we going?” “Why is everything changing?”

Muguleta was terrified to board the mysterious plane - and even more so when it seemed to be a new planet. And just as this strange place was starting to feel a bit like home, a new twist: his parents got divorced.

A project of Federation partner the Ethiopian National Project SPACE is an after school program that provides at-risk Ethiopian-Israeli kids the support they need to overcome obstacles and thrive in school.

While helping Muguleta cope with his difficult personal life, his SPACE teachers assigned him to a small learning group. They study each topic in depth and don’t move on until each student has mastered the material.

The results have been profound. In just a short time, Muguleta has gone from low grades to consistently earning scores in the high 80s and 90s.

Muguleta now knows he has strength. He survived the journey and the divorce,. And today, he’s thriving in school. With the confidence SPACE has instilled in him, he’s ready for yet another change — his transformation into a successful engineer.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY 2017 FEDERATION MEMBERS
CORPORATION RESOLUTION
JEWISH RELIGIOUS DIVERSITY IN ISRAEL
November 13, 2017**

Whereas, The Jewish Federations of North America view, with the highest priority, the preservation of the unity of the Jewish people; and

Whereas, the centrality of Israel to all Jews is fundamental to our very Peoplehood; and

Whereas, the support of the Jewish people for the State of Israel and identification with it are one of the most important strategic assets of the State of Israel; and

Whereas, on June 25, 2017 the Government of Israel suspended its resolution to implement the Kotel agreement reached with the Jewish Agency, the Religious Streams, Jewish Federations, the Rabbi of the Western Wall and the Prime Minister's Office, which would have ensured that the Kotel remain a unifying symbol for Jews around the world fulfilling the vision of "One Wall for One People" and the Government also sought to advance a conversion bill that would grant a formal and permanent monopoly on conversions in Israel to the Chief Rabbinate, which could take steps that permanently exclude hundreds of thousands of Israelis and other potential new immigrants from being considered part of the Jewish people; and

Whereas, these decisions create divides between the North American Jewish community and Israel and could undermine the Zionist vision and the State of Israel's sacred role as a national home for the entire Jewish people;

Therefore, be it resolved that

The Jewish Federations fully endorse the June 26, 2017 resolution of the Jewish Agency's Board of Governors (Exhibit A) which calls upon the Government of Israel to reverse its decision freezing the previously agreed to resolution on the Kotel and take all necessary action to ensure that these divisive and damaging steps, including those with regard to conversion, are halted; and

We will work with the Jewish Agency and other partners on an action plan to preserve the unity of the Jewish people; and actively oppose such measures; and

We urge the leaders of Israel to fully appreciate the strength of feeling on this matter, and its detrimental effect on Jewish unity and world Jewry relations.

JEWISH AGENCY FOR ISRAEL (JAFI) RESOLUTION

June 26, 2017

Whereas the Jewish Agency for Israel, representing world Jewry through its constituent members, the World Zionist Organization, The Jewish Federations of North America/United Israel Appeal and Keren Hayesod, is gathered in Jerusalem to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the reunification of Jerusalem, the liberation of the Western Wall and the founding of the Zionist movement in Basel 120 years ago; and

Whereas the Jewish Agency for Israel throughout its history has been the organization responsible for bringing olim to the State of Israel and connecting Israel and world Jewry; and

Whereas the proposed conversion bill that would cement the Chief Rabbinate's monopoly on conversion has the devastating potential to permanently exclude hundreds of thousands of Israelis from being a part of the Jewish people; and

Whereas we deplore yesterday's decision by Government of Israel which contradicts the agreement reached with the Jewish Agency and other parties to establish the Kotel as a unifying symbol for Jews around the world, as stated: '**ONE WALL FOR ONE PEOPLE**'; and

Whereas the Government of Israel's decisions have a deep potential to divide the Jewish people and to undermine the Zionist vision and dream of Herzl, Ben-Gurion, and Jabotinsky to establish Israel as a national home for the entire Jewish people; and

Whereas we declare that we cannot and must not allow this to happen and we are committed to mobilizing our constituencies for their continued support of the people and state of Israel;

Therefore, be it resolved that

– We call upon each Member of the Knesset and all elected public officials to take all necessary action to ensure that these dangerous and damaging steps are halted; and

– We will continue to build a broad coalition of Israelis, together with partners from around the world, who care passionately about keeping our people united and who are committed to the unity of the Jewish people; and

– We call upon the Government of Israel to understand the gravity of its steps and reverse its course of action accordingly.

SAGE NOTES

Dear All,

It's 71 degrees and sunny in Los Angeles. I wish you were here to attend the General Assembly (GA) of the Jewish Federations of North America and not because of the weather.

For me, the GA reminds me that we are part of something bigger, reinforces the importance of being part of the collective, offers opportunities to learn, and to be inspired. Volunteers and Jewish professionals gather to share best practices, new ideas and the latest information. Imagine a hotel nearly completely occupied by people with a connection to Federation and the hotel lobby and conference center decorated with Federation banners. I heard presentations and talked with representatives from our partner agencies Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI), Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (JDC) and ORT, and met with the Harold Grinspoon Foundation (PJ Library and LIFE & LEGACY™) and with colleagues. It is a great experience made better by others from Springfield attending Barry, Barbara, Julie and Raya Seidman, Rita Victor, and my husband, Rabbi Marks.

This year's theme "Venture Forward" resonated through each of the sessions, inspiring creativity, reminding us of the lives we change and save, challenging us to do more, and underscoring the importance of Federation as convener, honoring and learning from our differences with respectful dialogue, uniting rather than dividing, and including not excluding,

We heard from young Jewish social action philanthropists. Rachel Sumekh figured out how to donate unused funds from college meal plans to students struggling with hunger and founded "Swipe Out Hunger." Jackie Rotman founded "Everybody Dance Now" (EDN) which uses hip hop dance and culture as a tool for self-empowerment for young people. EDN has reached more than 1300 underserved youth across the US. There were special sessions on topics ranging from maintaining mission amid conflict to marketing, fund raising, philanthropy, global Jewish bridge builders, and Israel and us, the changing relationship, as well as a session for small Federations.

The LA influence brought us Marta Kaufman, the creator of TV's Friends and Nina Tassler, former chairwoman CBS entertainment, who spoke of social consciousness through a Jewish lens. And we listened intently to a story "soon-to-be-a-movie" emanating from a Shabbat dinner guest, Mohammed Al-Samawi, who told of his escape from Yemen made possible by four American activists who came together via Facebook and social media to activate networks.

Federation leadership from Houston and Florida described the impact of the immediate and continuing aid their communities received in the wake of Hurricanes Harvey and Irma. They marveled over Federation's nimbleness and explained how much it mattered to distribute actual cash via Houston's Rabbis to those who lost their homes and were in need of food and immediate shelter. We listened to how National Young Leadership shipped food and water to Dallas and arranged for semi-trailers to transport the goods.

President Reuven Rivlin of Israel addressed the GA in person, and Prime Minister Netanyahu spoke to us via satellite. Both emphasized the importance of the Jewish Diaspora and understanding each other, as did Natan Sharansky, CEO of the Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI), who spoke of the 30th Anniversary of the Soviet Jewry March on Washington. We heard from Rabbis who spoke of sacred disagreement and inspired us to strive to be our best.

I wish all of you were with us. The GA is something special. Next year in Tel Aviv...Please think about it and let me know if you're interested in attending.

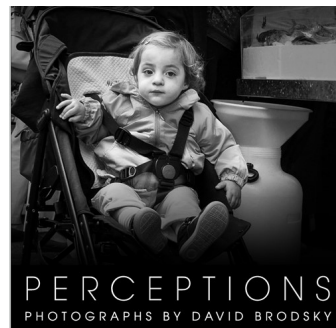

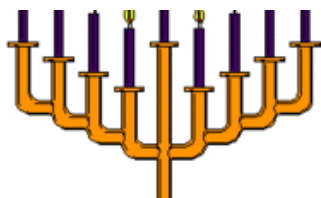
