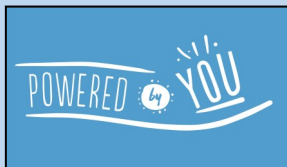

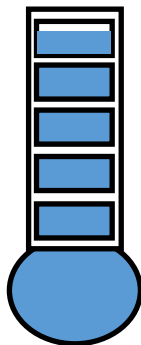

SAGE NOTES

Although we are, as my Federation colleagues describe it, in uncharted territory, I feel fortunate that our Federation Board is strong and wise, our staff is talented, our volunteers are committed, and that our community cares for and about each other. I also know that we will continue to benefit from the resources offered by our national movement or “the collective.”

Participating in the collective has been a source of strength for us over the years, providing us with consultation, and enabling us to pool our resources with other Federations in response to crisis. The past year’s challenges and crisis, from facility security to COVID, have heightened our reliance on the collective and the benefits our community has received from Jewish Federations of North America (JFNA) as well as Jewish Council on Public Affairs (JCPA).

Over the summer, at the behest of Pat Chesley, Federation President, Debbie Stein, JFNA’s liaison to small Federations, led the Board in a strategic planning initiative to assist in identifying priorities, best use of resources, and plans for the future. This is especially valuable today as it offers a framework for moving forward through uncertainty, although differently than initially imagined.

We formally joined Partnership2Gether (P2G) Western Galilee Consortium to offer opportunities to build people-to-people relationships between 16 U.S. communities, Israel’s Western Galilee, and Budapest, Hungary. P2G is sponsored by the Jewish Agency for Israel in conjunction with JFNA. While the getting to know each other phase through travel and visiting programs has been interrupted by the coronavirus, our Partnership has breached that barrier through online and virtual programs until travel resumes.

JCPA stewards the Jewish community’s interests through their public affairs agenda and provides support for local Jewish Community Relations Councils. Over the past months, JCPA increased its online seminars which are topical, timely and enrich our understanding of the issues that we face.

Last fall, Secure Community Network (SCN), funded primarily by JFNA and the Council of Presidents of Jewish Organizations, provided invaluable consultation to our community. SCN staff conducted on-site visits at Temple B’rith Sholom, Temple Israel, and Springfield Chabad to assess security needs and offer recommendations. They also met with local and Federal law enforcement, and described best practices in an all-community meeting.

From the beginning of the year, we have been pleased to offer JFNA’s expertise and technical assistance to local organizations for Federal grant and loan opportunities. JFNA along with JUF (Jewish Federation of Chicago) provided explanation, guidance and assistance for applying for funds to pay for improvements related to security through the Federal Security Grant program. The CARES Act opened the opportunity for non-profit organizations to apply for the Payroll Protection Plan loan/grant program that provides needed monies to sustain operations through the COVID crisis. JFNA applied its knowledge gleaned from working on the legislation in order to provide specific and up-to-date instructions for the loan application.

As we consider and plan for reopening our offices and temples, and try to identify best practices for group gatherings, we can again look to SCN’s leadership. SCN convened a panel of experts, including security directors and health professionals, to develop initial guidance to light the way.

JFNA’s focus on the future brought Jewish communal organizational leadership together to provide training in scenario planning. Scenario planning identifies forces that would influence how work could unfold in different circumstances and prepares possible responses during these times of uncertainty and change. Arden Lang, incoming Federation President, and I have completed the first of two sessions. For myself, the training has been inspiring and enlightening. I know now that our underlying commitment to the community will continue to drive what we do, whether it looks different, the same, or a mixture of both.

The mission of the Jewish Federation of Springfield, Illinois, is to serve the Jewish people locally, in Israel and throughout the world through coordinated fund raising, community-wide programming, social services and educational activities.
