On Thursday June 17, 2021, at 7 pm, Carl Cannon will speak to the Springfield community about Reentry: helping people succeed when they return to the community from imprisonment.

Carl was a “C.O.” - a correctional officer - in both a military prison (Leavenworth) and a federal prison (FCI Pekin). He won awards and promotions, but he decided to leave corrections work and to try to help people in his hometown, Peoria, who were struggling with their lives.

In Peoria, Carl started the ELITE (“Economic Leaders Integrating Trained Employable Youth”) program for both youth and adults. ELITE includes a Reentry Program for adults who were incarcerated. This Reentry Program offers community service, a 14-week retraining program, and placement in meaningful jobs. ELITE helps people learn to live better lives, thus helping families, neighborhoods and the entire community.

Carl is chairperson for the Peoria Housing Authority and serves on the Illinois Central College Board. He is recognized in the Hall of Fame for Caring Americans, among his many awards.

We strongly recommend Carl’s recent book, *Full Cannon: Love, Leadership and Making a Difference*, the inspirational story of his faith, service and action. Chapter 19 includes a detailed explanation of ELITE’s Adult Reentry Program. We request you join us as we hear Carl Cannon talk about helping people succeed after imprisonment.

# MESSAGE

## FROM THE PRESIDENT

### Remarks From the Annual Meeting

It is traditional that the Federation president reports to the membership on the prior year's activities. It is my honor and privilege to continue that tradition. It seems like just yesterday that our lives were turned upside down by the pandemic. A very minor consequence has been that the Federation's detailed plans for the 2020-2021 fiscal year went unfulfilled. Nevertheless, in the wake of uncertainty, our community pulled together, reset the calendar, and made new plans in the alternative, while still carrying out Federation's mission. That mission is to serve the Jewish people locally, in Israel, and throughout the world through coordinated fundraising, community-wide programming, social services, and educational activities. Our mission would not continue to be fulfilled without you. You are our leaders, past, present, and future. You are our volunteers. You are our ambassadors to our neighbors and throughout the nation and the world. You care for each other. You open your hearts. You are Federation personified.

The fiscal year has ended. Thanks go to the generosity, understanding, and willingness of our community to meet our Federation's challenges of the past year. Your efforts allow me to report that our Federation has had a successful year and will continue to be successful in the future.

Yes, we have not met in person. Yes, we have missed each other's companionship. And, yet, our educational and social programming has been tailored to meet our needs. We have had several stellar Zoom programs, even though we miss the fellowship of our Winetasting event or the annual film festival.

In that spirit, too, we have continued on with well-attended monthly Knosh and Knowledge programs, planned by the participants themselves, and with details executed by our program director, Betsy Salus. We reached more isolated seniors by conference call and mailed out their holiday baskets when we were not permitted to enter elder care facilities. Our goal for the upcoming year, no matter what the pandemic allows, is to devote a specified number of hours a month to one-on-one in-person or phone contact with our most frail seniors.

Recognizing that the need to alleviate food insecurity was even more pressing given the economic disruptions of the pandemic, the Jewish Community Relations Council worked with the Central Illinois Food Bank to distribute food at the Boys and Girls Club site. Our problem with the modified program was a good problem to have -- more of us wanted to participate physically in the food distribution than health regulations allowed.

There are so many people that make the work of Federation possible. First, our Professional Staff is just that. They are highly trained and are dedicated to the mission of Federation. I wish to thank our leader, Executive Director, Nancy Sage, in addition to our Program Director, Betsy Salus, and our longstanding Office Manager, Wendy Evans-Terry, along with our on-call social worker, Jordan Litvak. Our Board of Directors plays an active and important role as does our smaller Executive Board. Our JCRC chair, Bob Roth, has led a strong, active committee to meet today's challenges.

I particularly wish to thank the Response Team, including Nancy Sage, Bob Roth, Rabbi Datz, and Rabbi Stern, who have had more than enough unfortunate antisemitic incidents to deal with in the past several few months. The Team speaks freely together and decides what individual response is merited, considering factors in our own community and based on guidance from the expertise of Jewish Federations of North America (JFNA) and Jewish Council for Public Affairs (JCPA) as to best practices for dealing with hate issues. We pledge to be vigilant in rooting out threats to our people and dealing with them swiftly and intelligently.

Equally on our minds is the physical security of our community. Through Federation, JFNA, and SCN continue to offer workshops, material, and consultation to Jewish entities to beef up their security by applying for the government-funded National Security Grant Program. Temple B'rith Sholom applied and received a grant last year and Temple Israel has applied for a grant this year. There is no better use of JFNA resources than on enhancing the safety of our community.

While our Federation could not hold an in-person Campaign event this year, the 2020-2021 campaign exceeded its goal, thanks to your great generosity. Thank you for opening your hearts in this time of need. This Spring, our Federation revamped its campaign, creating a series of Campaign Salons, where you, as members, have been able to attend any or all of the five programs. These programs run the gamut of community interests. We also contracted our Campaign activities to an 80 day period. With your continued support, Federation has worked diligently for 80 years to fulfill its mission and will continue to do so.

Together we envision what we would like the next year to bring. We would hope to be a united people, learning and socializing together. We would like to be a community that helps each other and those around us and around the world, helps the outside world to understand us, and helps to quell the forces of hate and violence. Federation shares that vision. In our small way, Federation helps us to nurture and be nurtured. Thank you for all you do.

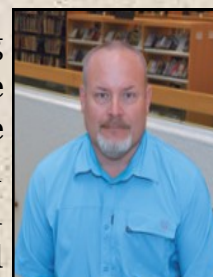
#### GET TO KNOW ROUTE 66 with CURTIS MANN

## JCRC—FOOD INSECURITY

### HUNGER HASN'T GONE AWAY AND NEITHER HAVE WE

For five consecutive years, the Jewish Federation of Springfield in cooperation with the Central Illinois Food Bank and with the support of both Temples, both Sisterhoods, B'nai B'rith, and Hadassah held a healthy food distribution. Those of you who volunteered at these events saw the overwhelming need and appreciation of the patrons who came to the event to receive food for themselves, their children, and their families.

Last year we were well into the planning stage for a sixth healthy food distribution. Then the pandemic hit and everything changed - **EXCEPT HUNGER**. The Central Illinois Food Bank discontinued its Healthy Food Distributions and we had to look for other ways to help.

Through the efforts of our Executive Director, Nancy Sage we found a way. With appreciation to Bank of Springfield and all JCRC organizations, the money that would normally be used to fund the Healthy Food Distribution was used instead to purchase canned goods from the Food Bank. These were packaged and given out at the Boys and Girls Club as part of their weekly food distribution as "extra" food.

At the present time, the Central Illinois Food Bank is still not holding Healthy Food Distributions. We still hope to sponsor one later in the year but in the meantime, the Food Insecurity Committee of JCRC has come up with new and exciting ways for us to help with this critical need.

On June 18, 2021 at 11:30 a.m. we will be holding our first food distribution in the parking lot of Temple Israel. The event will be different from previous food distributions but no less important.

Food will be supplied from the Central Illinois Food Bank through the Feed America program. The food will be placed on pallets in the TI parking lot and patrons will receive the food in their cars. Volunteers will put the food in the cars as they line up and drive through the parking lot. All volunteers will be masked and working outside so it will be a very safe event.

In the next few weeks, we will be asking for volunteers for the event. Although we only need about 10 volunteers for the event, this does not mean that we don't need you. We have already scheduled a second food distribution on Friday, July 16 with hopefully more in the future. We will do our best to make sure that everyone who wants to help will have a chance.

In addition, those who are not able to work at this event or those planned for the future have other ways to help fight food insufficiency. The Boys and Girls Club has a food distribution every Wednesday at 11:30 a.m. The operation runs the same as the food distributions we will be having. Volunteers arrive at 11 a.m. and the distribution is usually over by about 12:15 p.m. If you can volunteer, we encourage you to call the Boys and Girls Club at 217-544-0548 and tell Casey that you want to help. She will be grateful to have you.

Finally, we will be publishing a list of the mini food pantries in the area. If you can, help stock these mini food pantries with canned goods, packaged food, pet food, hygiene products and cleaning supplies; It will be much appreciated.

Thank you in advance for all that you do to combat food insecurity and please remember that without your financial contributions and willingness to volunteer, none of this would be possible.

# SAGE NOTES—Remarks from the Annual Meeting

It is an honor and privilege to serve as executive director of Federation, an organization that is eighty years strong. From its very beginning through today, during times of war and peace, the Holocaust, the birth of Israel, civil rights, Russian resettlement, saving and changing lives, the rise of antisemitism and the challenges of today, at the core of Federation is a community committed to the ideal of being responsible and caring for each other. It is our purpose, made possible because of your support and participation, and because of the exemplary leadership of our Board.

It has been a different year, a year of learning, a year of adapting, and a year of change due to circumstances far beyond our control. I am grateful to Arden Lang, Federation president for her wisdom, passion, strength, understanding, and time. She has guided us through this year, navigating the known and the unknown and is an inspiration.

To Federation's Executive Committee and Board, I am so appreciative for your involvement, care, and stewardship. Your service to the community is exemplary. Underlying every decision is how to best serve our community. You have been sources of encouragement, creativity, and strength. Our Board has reached out to members of the community and will continue to do so, just to

check in and say we care. Our Committee Chairs and members have been exceptional at continuing their work, although differently, and contributing their time over the past year.

I am fortunate to work with a staff that is as dedicated to the Federation's mission as they are talented. They are the reason behind everything that we have been able to accomplish and although we have been working apart, we continue to be a team. We could not succeed without Wendy Evans-Terry, office manager, and Betsy Salus, program director. Wendy set us up to work remotely, patiently found and walked us through new technology while continuing to edit the newsletter, manage the finances, design our graphics, and keep our history. She is Wendy the Wizard. Betsy deftly transformed our programs to the Zoom platform. It is not easy to find them and design them for "the flat screen." And, when the unexpected happens, which it does, Betsy is the best because her calm, kindness and class quite frankly, cover up the glitches. Her desire to always do it better shows when she puts together the senior packages, the weekly program notifications, and in everything she does. I welcome Jordan Litvak as on-call social worker. During these difficult times he has served our community well, especially those who have faced difficult life situations.

I would be remiss if I didn't say that Wendy, Betsy and I look forward to the very near future when we are all working primarily from the office.

I am proud, that together, we have forged forward and continued to work to fulfill our mission. We have taken advantage of programs offered virtually, both educational and entertaining, created our own, and collaborated with other Federations and offered more opportunities than ever through Knosh & Knowledge, the Education and Culture Committee, and Partnership2GETHER which pivoted to virtual events quickly and collaboratively. We have made the best of the situation at hand, staying in touch with homebound seniors via phone. Jewish Community Relations Council continues their focus on issues facing the community — food insecurity, the rise of antisemitism, criminal justice reform, race relations and Israel. JCRC continues to sponsor programs and to connect with community organizations throughout the city. That said, we are more than ready to return to in person programs and services when appropriate to do so.

Campaign, too, is different this year. The campaign committee creatively sought to present key components of Federation's work and interests; thus, they designed five Salons featuring speakers from within and outside our community.

I cannot thank enough the Response Team, Arden Lang, Federation President, Bob Roth, JCRC Chair, Rabbi Datz and Rabbi Stern. Anytime something happens and a community response is merited or requested, they make themselves available to address the issue. Each time, we assess the situation, we seek and review information from several sources, including national organizations to determine what action to take — whether quietly and privately addressing the situation, issuing a public statement, or taking no action at all.

We have been fortunate to have received funding on behalf of the Rosenwald Initiative for the Julius Rosenwald Mural from the Hanson Family Fund and generous individuals. We have been supportive of the endeavor to create a Julius Rosenwald National Historic Park. We are part of the core group organizing the Springfield Equal Justice Project that grew out of our decision to work with the Equal Justice Institute in Montgomery, Alabama, founded by Bryan Stephenson.

Our national organizations have been at our side assisting us throughout this time. Through Jewish Federations of North America and community generosity, we received their Human Services Matching grant, to support social, financial, and senior services; our community benefits from JFNA's expertise in so many ways — the National Security Grant Program, services of the Secure Community Network, their training and consultation that was designed to address these troubling times. Jewish Council for Public Affairs keeps us informed as to current issues confronting the country bringing in respected and knowledgeable speakers, in an unbelievable timely manner. And my colleagues, Federation and JCRC execs have been wonderfully generous in sharing their expertise and their programs. I do want to note that JUF, Chicago's Federation has been a wonderful source of information and a partner.

COVID created greater challenges to those living in need throughout the world and Jewish communities at risk. You, through your generosity to campaign, have changed lives and saved lives through the monies we give to the Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI), Joint Distribution Committee (JDC), ORT and our matching gift to Hadassah for Hadassah Neurim, a residential program for disadvantaged youth.

I am grateful for your support that enables us to fulfill our mission and to be faithful to the ideals of tikkun olam (repairing the world), gemilut chasadim (deeds of loving kindness) and k'lal yisrael (solidarity, responsibility and love for the Jewish people). Thank you so much.
