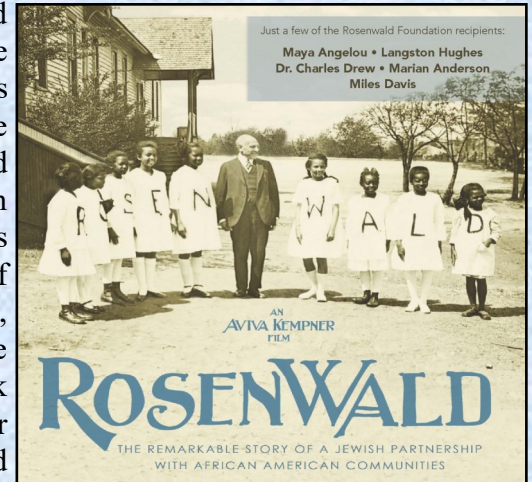

From the Springfield Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC)

It is always a delight when events exceed expectations and that is what happened on July 15th, when more than 700 people attended the screening of the documentary “Rosenwald.” This would not have happened had it not been for initiative taken by the Jewish Federation of Springfield’s JCRC and the Education and Culture Committee, along with the collaboration of our partners in the African-American community—Springfield and Central Illinois African-American History Museum, the Ministerial Alliance of Springfield and Vicinity, Frontiers International Club of Springfield, Union Baptist Church, and the Velma L. Carey Family Fund. In the weeks since the screening, I have been hearing positive feedback about the event. Just as important, through the planning process for this event, leaders within the Springfield Jewish community and Springfield African-American community have forged enhanced working relationships. Several years ago, the Spertus Institute in Chicago curated an art exhibit of the works of the Rosenwald Foundation fellows. The title of the exhibit was “A Force for Change.” How wonderful it would be if the Rosenwald legacy was to be a continued force for change in Springfield. In that vein, JCRC and the community partners are committed to continuing to work together to undertake additional activities to educate the Springfield community about the importance of Julius Rosenwald’s work and the impact it has had.



And, in case we needed a reminder about how important it is for the Jewish community to be engaged, last week we saw the ugly face of anti-Semitism in Charlottesville, Virginia, and this week, we learned that there may be White Supremacist groups fomenting in Springfield and in nearby Taylorville. While we are not aware of any activity by these groups, JCRC and the Jewish Federation will continue to vigilantly monitor the situation, both locally and nationally.

I want to thank all of you for helping to make my two years as program director for the Jewish Federation of Springfield a fun and rewarding experience. I found the opportunity to get to know so many of you a real plus. I will continue as an active Federation supporter and volunteer, and look forward to continuing to be part of many Federation activities. I just won't work as hard!



SAGE NOTES

This summer has been a summer of action, of substance, and of emotion. I was heartened by the nearly 750 people who attended the premiere of “Rosenwald” and that it was so well-received by the greater Springfield community. I am proud that Federation and Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC) worked for many months with our partner sponsor organizations in the African American community who made this possible. We learned from each other, and we learned to express and explain our differences. The premiere exemplified respect between and within our communities and yielded a commitment to continue to work together in pursuit of the ideas exemplified by the life and work of Julius Rosenwald.

In June, the Government of Israel voted to suspend the long-fought-for resolution that would permanently establish an egalitarian prayer space at the Kotel (Western Wall); and, the Ministerial Committee for Legislation approved a draft bill that would change the status quo on conversions by excluding those approved by the Israeli Orthodox Rabbinat that would change the status quo on conversions. In response, the Jewish Federation of Springfield and JCRC wrote to the Consul General of Israel to the Midwest and expressed that those actions “...betray the principle that the Jewish homeland is a state for all Jewish people, and break trust with the vast majority of Diaspora Jewry.”

This news broke when Jewish Federations of North America (JFNA) CEO Jerry Silverman, and several Federation executive directors were in Israel attending the annual meeting of partner agency Jewish Agency for Israel Federation (JAFI). Leadership directly and immediately expressed the dismay and deep disappointment of Diaspora Jews to Israeli government officials. They successfully negotiated a six month freeze on the conversion legislation and await an August 31 hearing regarding the Kotel Resolution. The meetings and actions on the ground continue. JFNA is on the forefront of these issues working closely with the Reform and Conservative movements, JAFI and other national Jewish organizations.

Your support over the years has positioned JFNA to work in pursuit of religious pluralism in conjunction with Israelis whose lives these decisions directly affect. Federations fund lifesaving and lifechanging services, not the Israeli government. JFNA Israel and Overseas Committee Chair, David Brown is the featured speaker for our 2018 Campaign. He will certainly offer insightful and up to date information regarding this situation and Federation’s impact on the lives of Jews and Jewish communities at risk.

The anti-Semitism exhibited in Charlottesville was deeply disturbing. Nazi and Confederate flags flying, chanting, and armed men in uniforms in front of the synagogue where Jews were holding Shabbat services were chilling reminders that racism, bigotry and hatred still exist and the importance and strength of community. “Community Conquers Hate” written by Richard Sandler, JFNA President and Jerry Silverman, JFNA CEO, reprinted in this bulletin is a call to action that our community continues to take.

COMMUNITY CONQUERS HATE

Throughout history, we've had to respond to those bent on destruction. When the Second Temple was destroyed and Jerusalem was burning, and the remnant of our people were sent into exile, leading sage Rabbi Yochanan ben Zakkai responded by building an academy. Known as Yavneh, it became a stark symbol of defiance in the face of withering hatred. This single act by a single individual is responsible for helping preserve the Jewish people and Jewish values over the past 2,000 years.

Evil always fills a void; it thrives on listlessness and chaos. The strongest answer of our people is to be truer to ourselves; to delve deeper into our heritage and values, and create a center of community where these can develop, thrive, and inform future generations. When we adhere to our sacred principles, we succeed in defeating the forces set against us, even those that physically threaten us. We learn to stand up for each other, even when we disagree — from our sages, we learn how to disagree.

We stand firmly with the good people of Charlottesville, as we do in all instances where evil persists. We mourn the tragic deaths of Heather Heyer, Lieutenant H. Jay Cullen, and Trooper Berke M.M. Bates, who lost their lives standing up for what is right and good. Our hearts go out to their families and friends, and we pray for a speedy and complete healing for those who were injured. We unequivocally condemn those who embody evil on this earth: white supremacists, neo-Nazis, the KKK, and all who pursue the path of hatred, prejudice, and xenophobia.

We reach out to ALL Americans from all walks of life who believe in the sanctity of our values of liberty, justice, and compassion. We lock arms with them because we know all too well that freedom is not free; we must be ever vigilant and active in its pursuit.

Actions speak louder than words. We back up these sentiments by striving even harder to imbue our communities with our values of tzedakah, chesed, and tikkun olam — of restoring balance to society by actively helping the needy, caring with compassion, and advancing the cause of repairing the world. This is the work of our Federations, day in and day out. By continuing to teach and build community through these principles, we play an essential role in creating the kind of future we seek for ourselves, our children, and future generations.

This must be our response today. Not to tear each other down, but to stand stronger in the face of *sinat chinam* — baseless hatred. We build community because there is no better guarantor of the future than a populace that sees itself as sharing a common destiny. We devote ourselves to helping those in need because, as a sacred responsibility of our people, this defines who we are in a way that words cannot.

Many organizations and leaders have different roles to play in this paradigm, and we must work together toward a powerful, unified rejection of hatred and prejudice. We need to be supportive of each other's efforts because each response is important. No one can be left behind; we must shore each other up and lead with distinction. Now is the time to coalesce — despite our disagreements — for the sake of our future.

In the enduring words of our sage Hillel: "If I am not for myself, who will be for me? If I am only for myself, what am I? If not now, when?"
