

EXPLANATION OF HOLIDAYS

ROSH HASHANAH

Jewish New Year, marks the beginning of the period considered the High Holy Days.

YOM KIPPUR

Day of Atonement, the holiest day of the Jewish year.

SUKKOT

Eight-day harvest and thanksgiving festival.

SHEMINI ATZERET

Marks the final day of Sukkot.

SIMCHAT TORAH

Joyous holiday that marks the completion of the yearly cycle of reading the Torah (Hebrew Bible) and the beginning of the next cycle.

CHANUKAH*

Eight-day festival of lights.

PURIM*

Celebrates the rescue of the Jewish community recounted in the Book of Esther.

PASSOVER

Commemorates the Jewish exodus from Egypt. Work is allowed during the middle days of Passover.

SHAVUOT

Commemorates the receiving of the Torah by the Israelites on Mt. Sinai.

SHABBAT

The Jewish Sabbath is observed every Friday evening to Saturday evening. Observant Jews refrain from work to devote time to prayer, reflection and rest.

The Jewish Community Relations Council has prepared this 5-year calendar of Jewish holidays as an aid for planning and scheduling events to minimize conflicts that involve the absence of Jewish community members.

Some members of the Jewish community will not participate in events during Shabbat. Chanukah and Purim do not require an absence from school or work.

Jewish holidays begin at sunset on the evening preceding the holiday.
