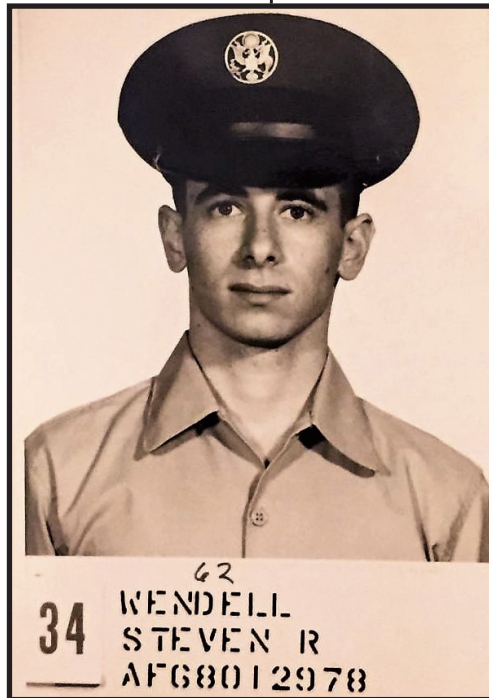
Executive Director's **Message** - Steven Wendell



At the writing of this column, March 10, the scenes of the Russian invasion of Ukraine, and its devastating consequences for the Ukrainian people, their cities, and homes, is playing in stark reality on TV and computer screens across the world. These pictures of the consequences of war on civilians, whether it be in Africa, Asia, the Middle East, or Europe, inevitably take me back to the 1960s, Vietnam, my anti-war days, including involvement with SDS (Students for a Democratic Society) on the campus of the University of Iowa, and the "draft." This is a story I don't often tell. I have great respect for the men and women who choose to serve in our military. And I am not a "conscientious objector." But the scenes of bombing apartment buildings, hospitals, evacuation convoys, and other obvious civilian targets in an attempt to destroy the morale of a people and their will to fight takes me back to the scenes of Napalm, Agent Orange, and Mai Lai.

In the comfort of our living rooms, many of us applauded the defiance and strength of the Ukrainian people in standing up to the Russian bully. And there have been some reports of Russian soldiers voluntarily surrendering or refusing to carry out orders in a war they do not support. Whether it be the brave Ukrainians, and their President, who

have told the Russians to "go f___ yourself," or the Russian soldiers who refuse to fight, or the brave Russian civilians risking prison to protest "Putin's War," most of us, at one time or another, face situations where we need to make difficult, moral, choices that potentially have significant, personal consequences, whether they be large or small.



One such moment for me came in 1967, when I lost my II-S student draft deferment and was reclassified I-A while still an upperclassman at the University of Iowa. The change resulted from President Johnson implementing the "normal progression" clause to the Vietnam War draft system. And since I had spent a year in Israel on an independent work/study tour, I lost my student deferment. For an anti-war activist wearing a button that said, "Hell No, I Won't Go," this was a moral crisis. I could not allow myself to

be drafted.

As a student from a comfortable, middle-class family, I knew that I could pursue a myriad of legal options to, at a minimum, postpone being drafted when my draft number was called. But as an activist, I also was acutely aware of the unfairness

of the draft and how it disproportionately affected young people who were not college students based on economics, whether it be an inability to pay for college or the need to work to support themselves and their families. So if I avoided or postponed being drafted when my number was called, someone with a higher number and less ability to avoid the draft would need to be called to meet the “quota” for draftees for that month.

My choice was to enlist on the condition that I be trained and assigned to a medical unit and serve my time saving lives. I chose the Air Force because the recruiter sounded sincere in promising me my assignment of choice. After taking the series of aptitude tests prior to enlistment and being told I was eligible to serve in a medical support unit, I “signed on the dotted line.” Of course, after basic training, I soon found out that whatever I was promised by a recruiter had little to do with reality. The Air Force, in its infinite wisdom, decided that my tests indicated I had an aptitude for something else they needed. I was to be trained and assigned to do logistical support on a Lockheed C-121 Warning Star aircraft, designed to direct and protect fighter aircraft mostly over North Vietnam during bombing raids. This also called for a relatively high-level security clearance.

At this point, I was back to “Hell No, I Won’t Go.”

There are many back story details to what happened to me from this point on. But the end result was an Honorable Discharge from the Air Force, which was a way for them to get rid of me and avoid some potential embarrassment regarding recruitment and clearing an anti-war, SDS, activist for a high-level security clearance. Turns out the JAG officer who took my case was good at his job and a quiet, anti-Vietnam War sympathizer himself.

This story could have ended very differently. And after all was said and done, my actions probably had no impact on the next person in line after me who was drafted to the Army.

In the decade from 1965 to 1975, US involvement in Vietnam cost the lives of 58,000 American troops and some 3 million Vietnamese. In May of 1967, in a memo to then President Lyndon Johnson, former Secretary of State, Robert McNamara wrote: “There may be a limit beyond which many Americans and much of the world will not permit the United States to go. The picture of the world’s greatest superpower killing or seriously injuring 1,000 non-combatants a week, while trying to pound a tiny, backward nation into submission on an issue whose merits are hotly disputed, is not a pretty one.” And in a memoir in 1995, McNamara wrote that his own behavior in shaping the war, which was often called, McNamara’s War, a term he himself endorsed, was “wrong, terribly wrong.”

While I don’t pretend to stand on any moral high ground with my personal decision on my role in the Vietnam War, and as noted, this is not a story I often tell, I can’t help but reflect that in some way, those decisions I made prior to and in the fall of 1967 and spring of 1968 reflect the values that I have attempted to carry during my 53-year, professional career serving the Jewish community, which began in the fall of 1968. That fall, at the start of my career, I joined with a minister and a priest to form the Greater Bridgeport Interfaith Draft Counseling Organization focused on helping inner city young people better understand their legal options relating to the Vietnam draft.

Putin, the Russian military, the Russian people, and the world might do well to remember the unfortunate lessons of Vietnam and the individual and collective roles all of us play during such maddening and destructive events.

Development Report - Sarah Barnett



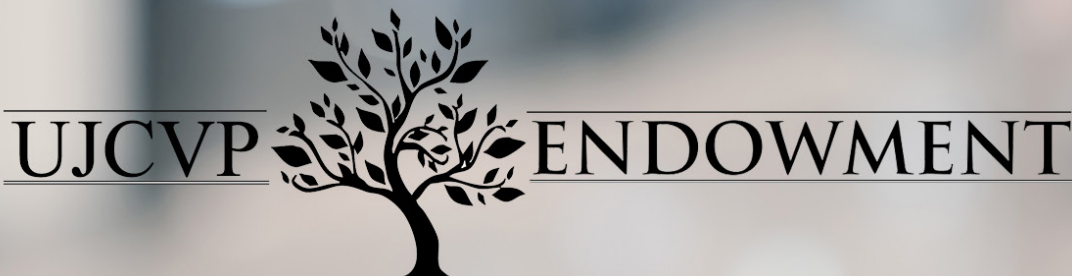
Dear Friends,

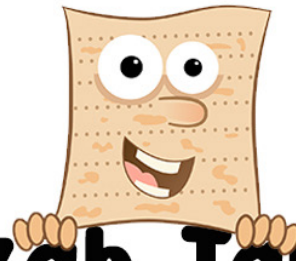

A Rabbi's Reflections, Part 1

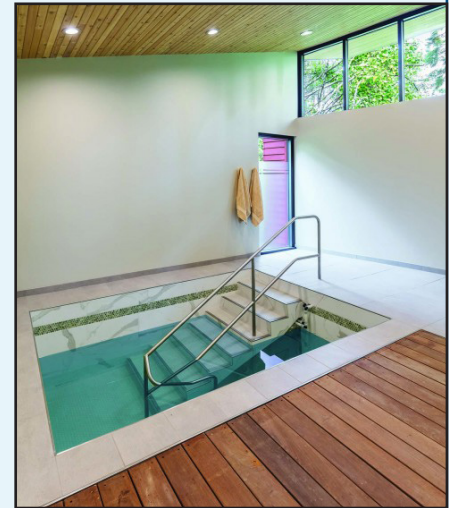

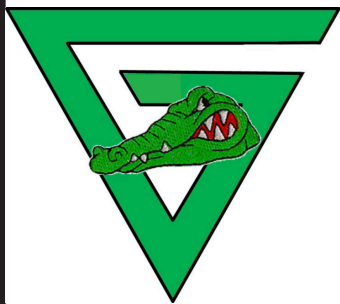

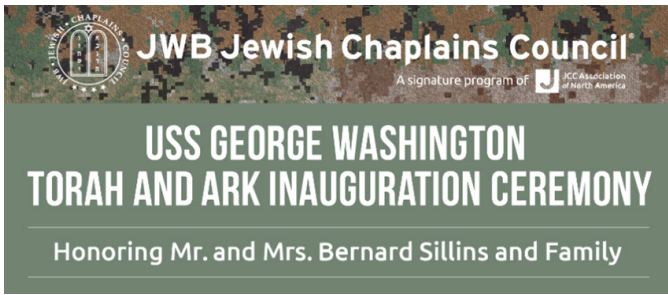

The UJC will have the privilege of hosting Doron Krakow, President and CEO of the Jewish Community Centers Association, and JCCA Board Chair, Gary Jacobs, in our community on Monday, April 11. Doron and Gary are looking forward to touring our campus and learning about our community and the programs we offer.

Prior to their visit to our community, Kelli Caplan, UJC Board President, and Steve Wendell, Executive Director, have been invited to join Gary and Doron, and other area dignitaries, in Norfolk for a very special program. The JCC Association of North America and JWB Jewish Chaplains Council® (JWB) is sponsoring a Torah and Ark Inauguration Ceremony aboard the USS George Washington aircraft carrier. This event will showcase another remarkable side of the work that the JCC Movement does in support Jewish military servicemembers.

JWB has a long-standing commitment to ensure that every carrier, ship, and military base or installation has the basic ritual objects to enable Jewish observance and worship—including a sefer Torah. Several years ago, the USS George Washington entered the Newport News Shipyards in Virginia for a multi-year and complex overhaul of the ship. While under repair, the ship’s Chaplain turned to JWB and Rabbi Irv Elson to hold and protect the ship’s well-traveled Torah which was also in need of significant restoration.

Thanks to the patriotic generosity of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Sillins and Family, the ship’s sefer Torah has been immaculately restored, and a custom-designed ark, resembling the hutch of President George Washington’s personal desk, has been crafted to hold the scroll in the ship’s new chapel space.



Doron Krakow is president and CEO of JCC Association of North America. Since joining JCC Association in 2017, he has guided the organization in forging new partnerships, deepening its relationships with philanthropic donors, and

strengthening Jewish life across the U.S. and Canada. Krakow, who brings more than 25 years’ experience with Jewish organizations to his work, previously held senior leadership posts with American Associates, Ben-Gurion University of the Negev; Jewish Federations of North America; and Young Judaea. He is a vice chair of the JPRO Network board and a board member of Tzofim: Friends of Israel Scouts. He holds an MBA from Cornell University and a bachelor’s degree in economics from Rutgers University. Krakow and his family are longtime members of the Kaplen JCC on the Palisades.



Gary E. Jacobs is the current board chair of JCC Association of North America. Jacobs is founder and managing director of Jacobs Investment Company LLC, which has over \$100 million dollars of investments, primarily in the United States and Israel. He is a general partner in NGT Healthcare

2, a technological incubator in Nazareth that focuses on Israeli Arab entrepreneurs. He serves as the board chair or a director of several private companies. Jacobs is chairman of the board of trustees of the Gary and Jerri-Ann Jacobs High Tech High, a charter school system with four campuses that serves 5,300 diverse students in San Diego, California. He is working with Israel’s Ministry of Education and school chains there to bring the High Tech High philosophy of education, equality, and social justice to the country’s schools. Jacobs also is co-founder of JITLI (Jacobs International Teen Leadership Institute), which is dedicated to bringing Jewish and Arab teenagers together to learn each other’s stories.

In 1943 with sounds of tank rounds and gunfire all around them, the last remaining Jews of Warsaw huddled together in bunkers to live their final hours as proud Jews, reading the Passover Haggadah. In the hours that followed, they would rise up to one of history's most iconic feats of resistance.

Today in Ukraine, Jews are gathered in basements and bunkers to daven and celebrate Shabbos and soon, to celebrate Passover, as tanks and bullets surround them.

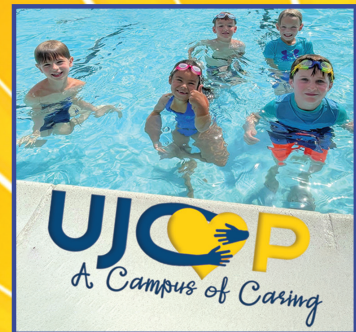
