Mission and Vision



Rockland County has the highest density Jewish population (by county) in the United States. With 106,000 Jews making up over 31% of the population here, the work we do at Federation is more vital than ever. Here is how we focus our efforts.

Bringing the Community Together

Rockland's Jewish community is unlike any other in its strengths and its challenges. Federation is the community's convener- celebrating our heritage, securing Jewish lives, institutions and congregations, acting together to support the people of Israel, and empowering our diverse community to take action against antisemitism. We communicate with all congregations and elements of the community to share information, bring people together and organize the work that needs to be done.

Strengthening Jewish Institutions

Leveraging the community's resources, Federation supports and enables expressions of Jewish identity and engagement, reaching a diverse population inclusive of background, observance, gender and race. We achieve this by delivering or supporting a range of Jewish services, programs and experiences- including in Rockland, in Israel, and around the world. We put a huge emphasis on securing all of these institutions through the Rockland Community Security Initiative.

Helping Those in Need

The vital needs of Jewish children, seniors and the vulnerable here and abroad are at the core of the Federation's identity and agency. We support this through allocation grants, directed gifts and legacy giving. Each year we direct Community Campaign funds to both existing partners and new grantees who are doing important work in the community.

Celebrating Jewish Life

Uniquely among Rockland's Jewish Institutions, Federation is a convener and uniting force. It acts in the community's interests to celebrate tradition, heritage and culture.

Acting with Integrity

Federation strives to maintain a steadfast ethical communal voice in Rockland, informed by consultation, partnerships, and collective action across divides both within and beyond the Jewish community. We operate in a non-partisan manner, working with all representatives across the political spectrum, for the greater good of our people. Our policies and actions are always guided by Jewish ethics.



Message from the Co-Presidents

We are pleased to present the annual report for the Jewish Federation & Foundation of Rockland County for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2026.

This past year, our community finally made it to Israel - on the third try! Our allocations delegation went to look for high impact opportunities for our community's Israel donations. With a focus on supporting IDF soldiers, reservists, and their families, especially through trauma support services, we visited with a number of organizations and were inspired by all of them. Though we had a hard time narrowing down the opportunities, in the end we made substantial investment grants to the following organizations: Niv Nirel Center, Chayal El Chayal and the Haifa Rape Crisis Center. With additional support, we also made smaller contributions to Temech and the Jordan River Children's Village. We hope to engage all of these organizations in a long-term relationship with our community.

Thank you to all those who attended our Comedy Night to benefit Niv Nirel and to those who joined us with Lior Raz, co-creator and star of Fauda, to raise funds for Magen David Adom (one of our longstanding partners). In these times especially, it is important to have fun while doing some good.

Following our focused work in Israel, we led a group of 30 diverse individuals on a community mission supporting Israel, learning first-hand about the impact of October 7th and the ongoing response to it. It was a meaningful trip with new friendships formed and new perspectives shared. Evan returned to Israel with her family in spring 2026 to dive a little more in depth into the traditional Israel tour experience. Like many, she and her family spent time in shelters among anxious but determined Israeli people in the early days of the missile barrage from Iran.

Locally, we continued to support our larger beneficiary agencies and expanded our reach with our small grant initiative (up to \$3000) for several organizations including Chabad Israel Jewish Center, Koshertroops, Nevut, Sparks, and The Friendship Circle. Six additional organizations will receive small grants in the coming days, and we will invite more applications this summer.

We continued to expand our reach with our Rockland Community Security Initiative. Close to 3000 volunteers were trained and 150 vulnerability assessments conducted across 300 organizations. We successfully applied for and received grant dollars supporting our security, though as these were at a smaller scale than our initial grant, we now rely more on community support. Our community is expected to pick up a greater share of the security costs each year unless we find alternate sources of funding. We continue to advocate for security dollars for our community at every level of government, and we are applying for grants.

This past year, we continued to make progress with the elements of our strategic plan, and we convened community leaders several times to do a "gut check" on whether the plan (developed 3 years ago) needed to be revisited post-October 7th. Input from the advisory group indicated a high interest in focusing on Jewish education, particularly for teens, leadership development, and legacy giving. Focused work in these areas will be a priority in 2026/2027.

It has been an honor to serve this community.

Message from the CEO

Almost all of us participate in a Passover Seder each year, and almost all of us will be familiar with the fun and meaningful song in the Haggadah - Dayenu - which means "It would have been enough." The Haggadah includes all of the details of the exodus, each of which would have been enough to praise and thank the Almighty.

Looking back over this past year, even as I am proud of our accomplishments, achievements, and our advocacy, I look out at our global Jewish community and I say "It isn't enough."

We brought over two dozen community members to Israel for the first time in several years, meeting Israelis, volunteering with great organizations like Leket, paying our respects as we learned on-site about the multiple tragedies of October 7th, and experiencing the sobered, but resilient and determined Israel that has emerged over the last two years. But it isn't enough. We need to bring more.

We met with and funded several incredibly worthy and effective Israeli charities, mostly addressing trauma and social resilience, but it isn't enough. We need to raise more funds to support more organizations.

We delivered security training to almost 1000 people in Rockland this year (now over 3000 since our Security Initiative began close to 4 years ago), in dozens of sessions, hundreds of consultations and assessments enabling millions in government grants, as we built our network to over 300 better secured Jewish institutions in Rockland. But it is not enough. We need to face rising threats with even more preparedness.

Our programs - informative, educational, musical, activist, even humorous - reached thousands of members of Rockland's Jewish community. But it is not enough. We need a motivated, educated and robust community to come together in even greater numbers.

Message from the CEO

We built upon long-standing relationships with our major local beneficiaries and welcomed many new ones with substantial grants to help those in need, build community, share our heritage and bring people together, but it is simply not enough. Together we must develop additional financial resources so that we can help even more.

Finally we confront the growing scourge of antisemitism on our streets, on social media, in our village halls, in local schools, and in businessplaces across Rockland. We've created strong alliances to fight this pernicious evil, and we have advocated right here in Rockland, in NYC, in Albany and in Washington DC to push back and overcome. But it is not enough.

The challenge grows, and our response must not only grow to meet it, but our true response must be to fund, to foster and to build Jewish life everywhere we can reach. That's the truest response.

Rockland's Community Security Initiative



Rockland County is home to one of the largest and most diverse Jewish populations in the United States, spanning synagogues, schools, camps, and community organizations across a wide range of denominations and backgrounds. From June 2025–June 2026, CSI deepened its presence across the county through training, vulnerability assessments, incident responses, and sustained partnerships with law enforcement and government agencies.

From June 2025–June 2026, CSI conducted 36 training sessions reaching 986 participants, including Active Threat, Stop the Bleed, Emergency Operations Planning and Lockdown Drill exercises, and Greeter/Screening training. These programs equipped community members, staff, volunteers, and lay leaders with practical skills to recognize threats, respond to emergencies, and coordinate with first responders. As a recent example, in May 2026, CSI Regional Security Director Ethan Erlich conducted two active threat preparedness training sessions at a Talmud Torah in Monsey (first with school leaders from the younger division, and a second with the older boys' cheider staff). Sessions covered active threat awareness, emergency response procedures, and practical communication protocols. This kind of tailored, institution-specific training was delivered in the context of that specific community and is what distinguishes CSI's approach across Rockland County.

CSI also completed 15 formal Threat and Vulnerability Assessments (TVAs) and 98 physical security consultations, helping institutions evaluate security enhancements, strengthen emergency planning, and position themselves for future grant opportunities.



Rockland's Community Security Initiative

Throughout the year, CSI also strengthened relationships with law enforcement partners and information sharing with local, state, and federal agencies, totaling 305 such engagements.

CSI's work extends beyond training and consultation. Over the past three years, CSI facilitated surge guard coverage on three occasions, administered grants to fund security personnel at five early childhood programs and camps, and supported institutions with additional targeted resources as needs arose. Nearly 3,000 community volunteers have been trained through CSI programs, forming a broad foundation of prepared, security-aware residents across the county.



As a partnership program of the Rockland Jewish Federation and JCRC NY, CSI has been able to build a community-wide security culture grounded in prevention, preparedness, and resilience.

In 2025, CSI's intelligence desk identified and assessed 221 threats to Jewish life, supported 5 arrests, facilitated 24 law enforcement interventions, tracked 42 interstate threat escalations, and monitored 97 international threats originating from 34 countries. These numbers reflect a key reality: dangers targeting New York's Jewish community frequently originate far beyond New York's borders.

A trained, vigilant and situationally aware community is a more secure community, and over the four years CSI has been active in Rockland, the community has taken great strides towards that goal.

Community Campaign, Community Relations and Programming

Our community focuses on engagement that brings people together, strengthens our bonds, honors our heritage and raises funds for those in need. What follows is a collection of engaging programming done by Federation in 2025-2026.

- In September 2025, we kicked off our **Community Campaign for 2026** with Israeli singer and IDF reservist **Omri Goren**. The event took place at New City Jewish Center and had over 200 attendees there to enjoy his beautiful music and gain insight into what Federation does in the community.
- In the Fall of 2025, 150 participants heard from well-known **Israeli journalist Lahav Harkov** of the Jewish Insider. Our program was titled "Where do we go from here?" with Harkov discussing the post-Gaza hostage return, and Israel's political, social, and electoral landscape after the war with Hamas.
- For Chanukah, we brought back our **Eight Days of Giving** program where we highlighted one of our partnerships for each day of the holiday and detailed why we support them. We also engaged in holiday programming and different menorah lightings throughout the community.



Community Relations and Programming

- When all of the hostages were finally home, we teamed up with UJA-NY for the **Hostage tag project** where we collected all of the pins and tags to be used in an art project memorializing 10/7.
- With the start of the Iran War, we hosted a **Community briefing on Iran with Ariella Rada**, Consul for Media Affairs from the Israeli consulate in New York.
- Cassie Blotner, Board member, and Yisroel Isaacs, Vice President, organized a **Comedy Night with Talia Reese** at Levity Live in West Nyack. Over 200 attended. Proceeds from the event went to the **Niv Nirel Center for Trauma and Rehabilitation**.
- In April, we hosted an informative webinar with **Rafi Josselson**, a **leading disability and inclusion activist**, on neurodivergence and inclusivity within the Jewish community, challenges faced, and how to create a welcoming space.
- Our annual **Yom Hazikaron program** featured Israeli style collective songs, prayers, and a moving message from a local IDF veteran from the **NEVUT Lone Soldier** organization who is also the brother of a fallen IDF soldier.



Community Relations and Programming

- In May 2026, partnering with AFMDA, 300 attendees joined us for an evening featuring **Lior Raz**, creator and star of the global sensation **Fauda**. Proceeds from the event supported training for resilience specialists helping first responders at Magen David Adom.
- Later in May, we brought together close to 100 participants to travel to New York City and march in the annual **Israel Day on Fifth** parade.
- Federation leadership attended memorials such as the **9/11 Rockland County remembrance** program in Haverstraw as well as **Yom HaShoah programs** at the Rockland County Courthouse.
- In June, we hosted an **Organ Donation webinar** where attendees were educated on the mitzvah of making life saving organ donations with Rabbi Joshua Rabin and LiveOnNY.
- Additional programming included events with:
 - **Hadassah Women, RBBN, Rockland B2B Networking, Movement Against Anti Zionism (MAAZ) communications training, Educational programming in partnership with Dominican University, Giving Tuesday for Nevut- helping IDF and lone soldiers transition back to civilian life.**



Advocacy.

Advocacy is one of the core tenets of what we do at Federation. Our voice is our strength and we must make sure that we are heard when it comes time to advocate for the safety and dignity of our people. Our lay leaders and professional advocates have traveled to **Albany** and **Washington DC** to meet with **lawmakers and with Congress** to address the security needs of the Jewish community, including advocating for buffer zones and the new Jewish American Security Act.

We also regularly engage with village, town and county **government** as well as **local school boards** to both advocate for our community's needs and address emergent challenges and incidents that have occurred.



Federation volunteers have spoken at several **town and village halls** in Rockland to counter anti-Jewish and anti-Zionist agendas. We also engage with government and NGOs on food security, public health, seniors, and inclusion for disabled members of the community.

Our partnerships through congregational partners, as well as civil society, are integral to our role in building community in Rockland. It's essential that we engage in outreach to other impactful organizations in the community and all work together for the greater good.

➔ Nevut

Nevut empowers IDF Lone Soldier veterans as they transition to civilian life. Led by Rabbi Ari Abramowitz, this organization provides essential mental health and well-being services to soldiers who have completed their services and returned to the United States. They use a one-on-one case management protocol to ensure that each individual's needs are uniquely met. Nevut is the leading organization in the United States that is dedicated to supporting IDF veterans.

➔ Chabad Israel Jewish Center

Chabad Israel Jewish Center in Nanuet has an annual outreach program for unaffiliated Israeli/Hebrew speaking families who live in Rockland. They help establish roots and find support systems and congregations to engage with.

The Friendship Circle provides services to families with children or young adults with special needs. Friendship Circle is focused on providing activities and experiences for the kids, while also providing support for the parents. The wide variety of programming allows for strong friendships to form within the community. Adult and teen volunteers are also a part of the organization.

Sparks is a local women's organization dedicated to helping mothers with young children. They provide mental health support and a network, specifically for the postpartum period.

Israel Allocations

In November of 2025, after several attempts stymied by post 10/7 conflict, we were finally able to take two groups of community members to Israel. Members of the Federation's allocations committee, joined by community members, met with several worthy organizations to determine how Community Campaign and Foundation funds could be best deployed to help Israelis recovering from the trauma, displacement and difficulties of over two years of war.



- ➔ **Niv Nirel Center**: a pioneering trauma and rehabilitation facility in Israel dedicated to treating veterans experiencing combat-related trauma, facilitating research and training therapists, founded in the aftermath of October 7th.
- ➔ **Chayal el Chayal**: Founded in 2010 to help lone soldiers on leave from the IDF with education, meals, accommodations, guidance and community.
- ➔ **Haifa Rape Crisis Center**: Comprehensive shelter, legal aid, therapy, medical treatment and support for victims of sexual violence and their families.
- ➔ **Leket**: A national food bank that rescues surplus food and serves 330,000 people weekly.
- ➔ **Jordan River Village**: A respite and creative camp experience for children living with serious illnesses or disabilities.
- ➔ **Temech**: Women helping women - Temech is dedicated to advancing the employment and entrepreneurial opportunities of Haredi women in Israel.

Holocaust Museum and Center for Tolerance and Education

Federation is proud to partner with the Holocaust Museum and Center for Tolerance and Education as a key beneficiary of our Community Campaign. The Holocaust Museum sees visits from tens of thousands of students from across Rockland and surrounding counties, from local and regional parochial and public schools. More than two dozen local Holocaust survivors participate in the Museum's educational programming. Sharing the experience of the Holocaust is a starting point for discussion, dialogue, and educating against hate. The Museum has also developed and deployed a groundbreaking initiative for teens in partnership with the Haverstraw African American Connection, Better Together, which engages in challenging conversations to break down misconceptions and prejudice.

With the sharp rise in antisemitism, Federation remains steadfast in our commitment to HMCTE as the integral educational element of our strategy to confront hate and bias. Helping to build diversity, tolerance and respect within and beyond the community is essential. This includes regular consultation, joint programming, and cooperative work with local school districts, as well as advocacy to New York State in advancing its Holocaust education mandate.

Rockland Jewish Family Service

Rockland Jewish Family Service is the quiet hero among Federation's beneficiary agencies. Federation proudly supports their programming and services. These include Family-Based Clinical Counseling Services, Social Skills Education, Older Adult Services - especially Holocaust survivor support - and the Rhoda Bloom Kosher Food Pantry. Since October 7th, they have provided additional counseling and resources to the many people in our community who have been hurt, traumatized, bereaved and saddened by what has happened and by our new collective reality.



RJFS, like many non-profits throughout the nation, has been challenged by the changing grant environment. Federation has maintained our support and advocated to our representatives for the impacts of these freezes and changes to be mitigated and addressed. We will continue to be a stalwart supporter of RJFS' vital work, and will look for ways to further support their work.

Midreshet



Federation's Midreshet programming serves our constituency of adult learners with three sessions throughout the calendar year. This past year we saw an increase in registrations with just over 160 registrations. Midreshet courses are taught by Rockland Rabbis, leaders and educators for different segments of our community on a number of Jewish topics. This past year we had courses such as: The Jewish Journey Through Life, Women in the Bible, From Zionism to Statehood - The Birth of Israel, Zionism for the 21st Century, Hebrew Through Music, and Understanding G-d.

In February, we gathered some of our wonderful educators to help us put on another Rockland Day of Jewish Learning with just over 50 participants.

PJ Library.

Federation has delivered Jewish themed books monthly, to over 470 children across the community, through our partnership with the Grinspoon Foundation and PJ Library. This was an increase from our numbers in 2024-2025 and we are proud to be educating more young minds!

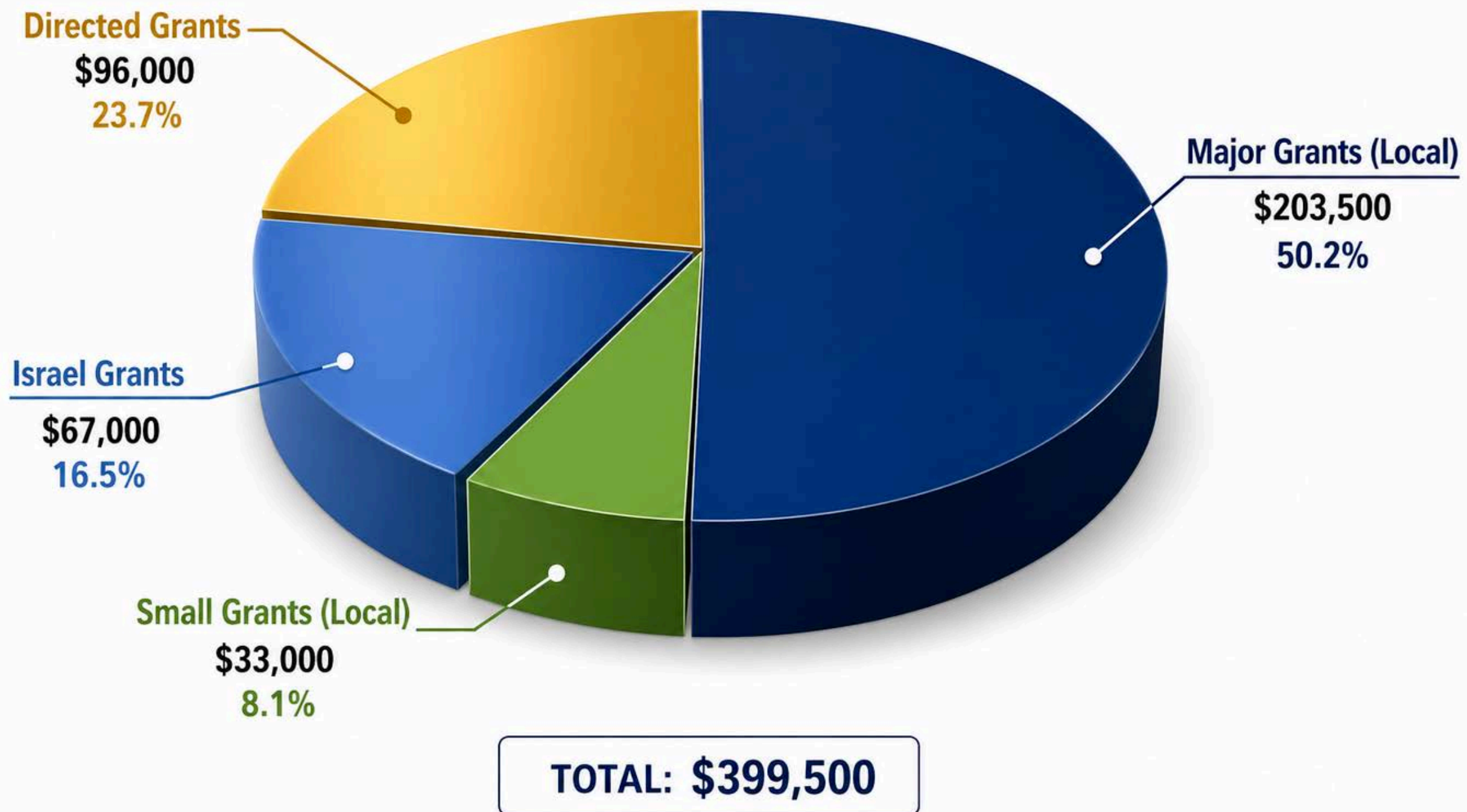
The PJ Library program shares monthly updates with local programming and resources, including local child-friendly events with Jewish content in Rockland County.
