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How does it work?

- You leave a gift to the Jewish Federation of Greater Indianapolis, of a specific dollar amount, or a percentage of your estate or the residue of your estate.
- There is no limit on the amount that you can provide from your estate for a charitable bequest.
- Your bequest can include cash, securities or other property. Your estate may receive an estate tax deduction for your bequest.
- You may establish a testamentary charitable remainder trust or charitable gift annuity through your trust or will that provides payments to one or more designated beneficiaries, with the remainder going to the Federation upon their deaths.
- If you already have a trust or will in place, your attorney can prepare a simple amendment or codicil to provide for your bequest.
- You direct the Federation regarding allocation of your bequest. For example, you can create or augment an unrestricted endowment fund. If you're a Lion of Judah, you may want your legacy to live on through a Lion of Judah Endowment Fund. If Jewish education or some other particular cause is especially close to your heart, you can set up a special purpose fund. You can also create a donor advised fund or a supporting foundation.

What are the benefits

- You invest in the future of the Jewish community.
- You perpetuate your values and become a role model for future generations.

Here are some examples of typical bequest language in a trust or a will that you may wish to share with your legal counsel:

To make an unrestricted bequest to the Federation:

I give \$____ (or specified property) to the Jewish Federation of Greater Indianapolis

To make a bequest to the Federation to establish an endowed fund:

I give \$____ (or specified property) to the Jewish Federation of Greater Indianapolis to establish a fund to be known as the "____ Fund," subject to the Federation's rules governing the operation of endowment funds, the annual distribution from which shall be used to support (choose one or more):

- the Federation's unrestricted endowment fund
- the Federation's Annual Campaign
- a specific area of interest (e.g., Jewish education, children at risk, elder services)
- a particular partner agency or agencies of the Federation

To add a bequest to an existing fund of the Federation:

I give \$____ (or specified property) to the Jewish Federation of Greater Indianapolis to be added to the "____ Fund," subject to the Federation's rules governing the operation of endowment funds.

To make a bequest in a will to Partner Organization of the LIFE & LEGACY program:

Upon my death, I give and bequeath \$____ or ____% of my estate to the ____ (name of Legacy Partner organization) Legacy Partner Endowment Fund of the Jewish Federation of Greater Indianapolis.
