Polly Beeson's commitment to Jewish communal service is woven into who she is. Growing up in Greater Lafayette, she watched her parents devote countless hours to the local Jewish community and the Purdue Hillel Board, showing her what it takes to build and sustain vibrant Jewish life through dedication and service.

"I now understand that our community cannot stand without that kind of commitment," Polly reflects. "The Jewish community my family enjoyed, and that I want my own family to enjoy for generations, exists because people before us invested their time, resources, and hearts into something lasting."

That understanding drives her service with JFGI. A proud member of the Prystowsky ATID 6 Cohort, Polly found meaningful leadership opportunities and now serves as Co-Chair of the Israel & Overseas Committee and sits on the Planning & Allocations committee.

"I'm honored to co-chair this committee and to represent our community's investment in causes that benefit not just today, but the future," she says. "When we support Israel and

Jewish communities overseas, we help ensure Jewish life continues to flourish everywhere, creating a foundation for future generations."

Carly Turow is proud to serve as Co-Chair of JFGI's Israel and Overseas Committee, where she brings a lifelong commitment to Jewish community, philanthropy, and global connection. A dedicated volunteer leader, Carly also serves on JFGI's Planning & Allocations Committee and is active in Women's Philanthropy.

Her Jewish leadership journey began as Religious Chair for IFTY in high

school and continues today across multiple institutions. At Indianapolis Hebrew Congregation (IHC), she is serving her second term on the Board of Directors and sits on the Executive Committee. Carly has also served on the Ethics Task Force (co-drafting IHC's Ethics Policy), the Israel Committee, the Governance Committee, and as a representative to the IHC Foundation Board. In addition, she serves as Treasurer on the Board of Purdue Hillel Foundation and is a committed volunteer with both Hillel and the broader Purdue community.

Carly's grandparents came to Indianapolis after escaping from Germany & Austria in the years leading up to World War II. She grew up at IHC and is now raising the fourth generation of her family there.

Carly and her husband, Larry, who is currently Treasurer for Federation, share a passion for Jewish life and Israel. They travelled to Israel together for the first time in 2010. Since then, they've each made at least six trips to Israel, including a trip to celebrate their oldest son becoming a Bar Mitzvah. Together, they are raising three college-aged children (two Boilermakers and one future Loyola Rambler) and one cat, who has opted out of higher education.

Professionally, Carly is a proud Purdue alumna (B.S., Industrial Engineering) and currently works in university-industry engagement. Since joining Purdue University in 2014, she has held roles in the Technical Assistance Program and Purdue Polytechnic Institute. Her career spans engineering, law, and higher education; always with a focus on systems, strategy, and meaningful connection.

## A New Scroll, A Renewed Light: Etz Chaim Welcomes a Torah

On a frigid January day, members of Etz Chaim Sephardic Congregation set out on foot from Hooverwood Living, walking under a chuppah, singing and dancing as they carried something far more powerful than parchment. The newly completed Torah marked not just an addition to the ark, but a statement of pride, continuity, and resilience for Indianapolis' Sephardic Jewish community.

"This is a Torah and case," said Alan Cohen, president of Etz Chaim. "There are differences in Sephardic Torahs, dialect and how they write things, but virtually identical in nature."

The project began with an idea sparked by Saar Alkobi.

"The idea [was] to fundraise for a Torah from individual members," Cohen explained. "It's a mitzvah to be able to donate a Torah in someone's memory and honor."

Etz Chaim had done something similar years earlier, and when the idea resurfaced, the response was swift.

"It only took one to two months for everyone to step up," Cohen said.

While not every congregant can participate financially, Cohen



emphasized that the motivation runs deeper, "Not something everyone can do, it has financial requirements, but more from the heart of what people want to present and honor for people." The Torah itself was painstakingly created in Israel.

"This Torah took six to eight months to make," Cohen said. "All hand done and put together, hand written with a parsha and quill."

Once completed, the scroll was brought to the United States by a member returning from Israel. The traditional Sephardic case was ordered separately and assembled locally.

The celebration, known as a Hachnasat Sefer Torah, was both ceremonial and jubilant.

"The procession is dedicating the Torah to its first location," Cohen explained. "It's more of a celebration. Dancing and singing, it's a big happy celebration."

Etz Chaim Rabbi Daniel Ashkenazi said the timing of the Torah's arrival gave the event even greater meaning.

"Receiving a new Torah is always a great joy for any congregation," he said. "But I believe in this case, so close to what is happening in Israel and with Jewish communities worldwide, we were celebrating the coming of a new Torah during a time that we as Jews needed to feel proud as being Jewish."

"We as Jews fight darkness with light and antisemitism with Torah and with more and more Jewish life," he added. The new Torah has quickly become central to congregational worship.

"We use the Torah during Shabbat services and during the daily minyan," Rabbi Ashkenazi said. "We have been using two Torahs because we do double readings during Shabbat sometimes. We use the new Torah the most."





Etz Chaim currently holds six to eight kosher Torahs, some more than a century old.

“Sometimes Torahs can be damaged,” Cohen said. “Once a Torah becomes non-kosher for any reason, you cannot read from it until it has been repaired.” Environmental factors like humidity, age, or compromised parchment can affect a scroll’s integrity, making renewal and preservation essential.

“The Torah scrolls tell the story of the community,” Rabbi Ashkenazi



reflected. “Every Torah has a story behind it of people who worked very hard to bring the Torah to the congregation.”

The dedication was a true communal effort, with donors, volunteers, and guests from across the Jewish community participating.

“Other people from other congregations came to attend the event and it unifies the community,” Ashkenazi said.

For Etz Chaim, the new Torah

represents more than beauty or tradition.

“We are very thankful that we can bring a new Torah,” he said, “and we are writing a new milestone in the life of the community in Indianapolis.”

# An Indiana State Student's Life-Changing Journey to Israel

Miles Clapp never expected to walk through some of the holiest sites in Israel. A sophomore at Indiana State University, Clapp balances leadership roles on campus, serving as student government vice president and holding positions in his fraternity.

Earlier this year, however, he stepped into a different leadership experience through Jewish National Fund-USA's Caravan for Democracy, an educational trip that brings non-Jewish student leaders to Israel to explore its history, culture, and contemporary realities firsthand.

Clapp learned about the program after attending the National Leadership Summit in Washington, D.C., where he met past participants. Intrigued, he researched the program and applied.

"I wanted to understand the conflict instead of relying solely on rhetoric," he said, noting that while Indiana State has a small Jewish population, he closely followed national protests and wanted more context after October 7.

Before the trip, Clapp said his understanding of Israel came mostly from media and headlines. Once there, he was struck by the country's diversity, particularly in cities like Haifa.

"Seeing Arabs and Jews living alongside each other challenged the narrative I'd often heard," he said.

As a lifelong Protestant, Clapp was deeply moved by visiting Christian holy sites such as the Church of the Holy Sepulchre.

"Being physically present made the biblical stories feel real," he said.

Equally impactful was the warmth of the people. "Despite trauma, Israelis carry a strong joy for life and desire for peace," he said, recalling an unforgettable moment dancing with strangers at the Western Wall.

Now back on campus, Clapp says the experience gave him confidence to address misinformation.

"I feel equipped to explain the conflict based on what I learned firsthand," he said, and plans to continue sharing his experiences with fellow students.

## A Year in Reflection and a Vision for What's Next

In just five years, we've multiplied our volunteer base tenfold and grown from serving 300 households annually to over 2,000. This is a pivotal time to engage lay leaders who will help guide our strategic direction and partner with us as we navigate the challenges and opportunities ahead.

This vision for growth and sustainability fits into a larger picture. It has been a privilege to meet regularly with fellow Jewish agency leaders to discuss our shared hopes for the future of the Indianapolis Jewish community and how we can work better together.

My biggest sense of pride comes from the JFS team, and I am deeply grateful to work alongside them. Every day, they support individuals and families with compassion and skill, while also laying the groundwork for the future of JFS. They work closely with dedicated volunteers, leverage external resources, and creatively develop new service opportunities to better support this community. One of the most exciting initiatives has been spearheaded by our Clinical Director, Julie Sondhelm, who has strategically built the foundation for our new Therapy Program. It's one example of how our team is building the next chapter of JFS together.

This year has also reminded me how deeply personal this work can be. The hardest moment, without question, was losing our beloved colleague, mentor, and friend, Lori Popp Moss. Lori's leadership and heart shaped JFS in countless ways, and she had a profound impact on each of us. It is an honor to carry forward the strong foundation she helped build.

JFS is growing with purpose, compassion, and deep gratitude for the people who make this work possible. We look forward to sharing our impact and our vision for what comes next at our Annual Meeting. We can't do this alone, and we are truly thankful for your partnership. I hope you'll join us as we continue building a stronger, healthier community together.

# A Note From Leadership

Capturing the full impact of the Jewish Federation of Greater Indianapolis in 2025 is no small task. Record attendance at engagement programs across all age groups, recognition of emerging community leaders at our inaugural 18 Under 18 celebration, strong participation in leadership development programs where future lay leaders are thriving, and an annual campaign that exceeded \$5 million for the first time since 2008 all tell part of the story. ## Challah Prince Launches 2025 Annual Campaign

The Federation kicked off the 2025 Annual Campaign with a sold out challah braiding workshop led by Idan Chabasov, the Challah Prince. Participants of all ages learned creative braiding techniques and took home challah to bake for Shabbat.

The event drew many first-time Federation participants, offering a warm introduction to community life and the Federation's mission. More than a culinary workshop, the evening celebrated tradition, connection, and multigenerational engagement setting an inspiring tone for the year ahead.



## Partnership2Gether (P2G) Mission Trips



In February, 15 Indianapolis leaders joined a 25 person international delegation for the Partnership2Gether Western Galilee Solidarity Mission, gaining firsthand insight into how the war has shaped daily life in the region. The mission strengthened relationships, deepened understanding, and reaffirmed the resilience of the Western Galilee community.

In October, 15 Indianapolis community members traveled to Israel for the Partnership2Gether Summit in the Western Galilee, strengthening relationships and shared commitments to resilience and Jewish peoplehood. Participants toured local communities, met with Israeli partners, and explored collaborative programs shaping the future of the Partnership.

## P2G Academic & Medical Delegations

In 2025, Indianapolis hosted two meaningful Partnership2Gether delegations from the Western Galilee, each deepening mutual learning and strengthening personal ties. In July, two physicians from Galilee Medical Center shared firsthand insights into delivering care just six miles from the Lebanese border and operating an underground hospital supported in part by Indianapolis donors. Their visit highlighted the region's resilience and the powerful impact of global Jewish solidarity.

In November, an Academic Delegation engaged local partners on security, criminology, youth at risk, and emerging technologies, while also launching this year's Hasten Hebrew Academy, Gvanim School twinning partnership. Across campus visits, agency gatherings, and home hospitality, both delegations reinforced the shared values, professional exchange, and enduring relationships at the heart of Partnership2Gether.



# Coming Together in Sadness and Strength

In February, community members gathered and stood in solidarity with Israel to honor the memories of Oded Lifschitz z”l, Shiri Bibas z”l, Ariel Bibas z”l, and Kfir Bibas z”l.

JCRC President Eli Isaacs reflected on the community’s grief and resilience, noting that even in moments of deep sorrow, the Jewish people continue to seek humanity, love, and peace.

Members of the local Israeli community, clergy, and teens led prayers, readings, and songs, while volunteers read the names of hostages still in captivity, bringing a powerful silence to the room.

The gathering concluded with a candlelit walk to Celebration Plaza, where Cantors Melissa Cohen and Aviva Marer, accompanied by Rabbi Brett Krichiver, led the community in song, closing the evening with unity and hope.



## October 7 Commemoration

In the days following the release of the final living hostages, the Indianapolis Jewish community came together for a moving October 7 commemoration. The gathering blended personal testimony, communal prayer and artistic expression, creating a shared space for mourning and reflection. A survivor of the Nova music festival offered a powerful firsthand account that grounded the evening in lived experience, while clergy from across the community led poems, readings, prayers and musical selections that spoke to grief, resilience and hope.



## New Shlichah (Israeli Emissary)

Since arriving in Indianapolis in September, Community Shlichah Gaya has infused the community with energy, warmth, and authentic connection to Israel. Just two days after landing, she addressed more than 250 attendees at the Women’s Philanthropy Signature Event, setting the stage for a year of meaningful engagement. She played a central role in shaping the community’s October 7 Memorial, ensuring it reflected both compassion and resilience.

Throughout the year, Gaya has immersed herself in community life, working and sharing Israeli culture with students of all ages, teaching Hebrew, and creating programs for young adults.

# Yom HaZikaron & Yom Ha'atzmaut

On April 27, the community gathered for a powerful dual observance of Yom HaZikaron and Yom Ha'atzmaut, blending solemn remembrance with joyful celebration of Israel's independence.

The ceremony featured a tribute to Sivan Sade, a young agricultural worker from the Western Galilee who was killed by a rocket attack. The song "Yeled Hasade," performed by Yochi Black and Bob Schneider, honored her memory and set a reflective tone for the afternoon. Guest speaker Matan Elul offered a compelling message of bravery and resilience, sharing firsthand insights into Israel's ongoing challenges.

Festivities continued with Israeli dancing, engaging family activities, and a vibrant atmosphere created by local artists and vendors. An Exhibitors Hall highlighted local Jewish organizations, giving attendees opportunities to learn, connect, and engage more deeply with community initiatives.

In 2025, NEXTGen delivered one of its most dynamic years yet, offering young adults meaningful Jewish engagement, learning, and community connection. ## Maurer Jewish Community Library

The Maurer Jewish Community Library enriches Jewish learning by offering wide access to Jewish literature, history, and cultural resources. As part of the Indianapolis Public Library Shared System, it serves patrons across Central Indiana with materials ranging from fiction and biography to Holocaust studies.

The library’s Holocaust collection is a growing resource for Marion County schools seeking curriculum support. It also houses Jewish life cycle items from the Celebration Station, which are loaned to schools, museums, and community organizations to promote Jewish culture and education.

## Safe Indiana Community Safety Initiative

In 2025, the Safe Indiana Community Safety Initiative saw significant growth and strengthened statewide security infrastructure. With support from partner communities in Northwest Indiana and the St. Joseph Valley, the initiative received \$240,000 through JFNA's LiveSecure grant program, enabling continued statewide security leadership over the next three years. Additionally, JFGI secured nearly \$30,000 from the Tepper Foundation Security Fund to enhance physical security staffing for early childhood programs.

To improve facility safety, the initiative provided tailored security assessments outlining best practice recommendations. These assessments supported successful applications to FEMA's Nonprofit Security Grant Program (NSGP), resulting in more than \$800,000 awarded to local organizations for critical security enhancements.

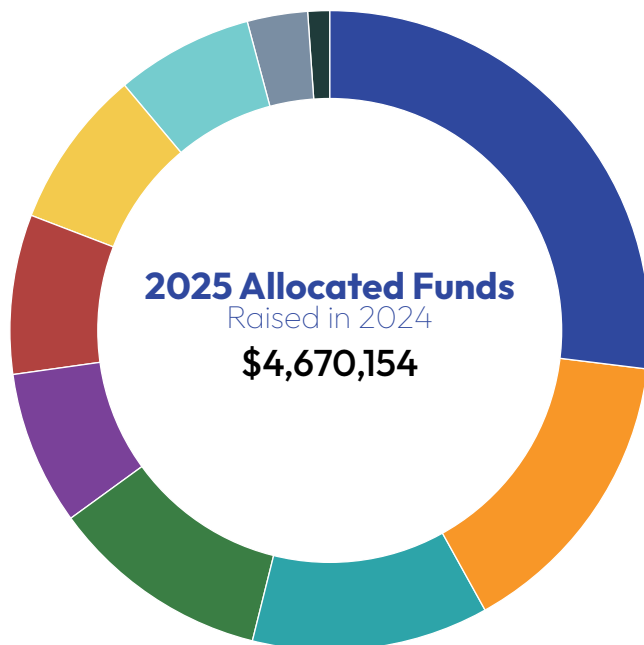

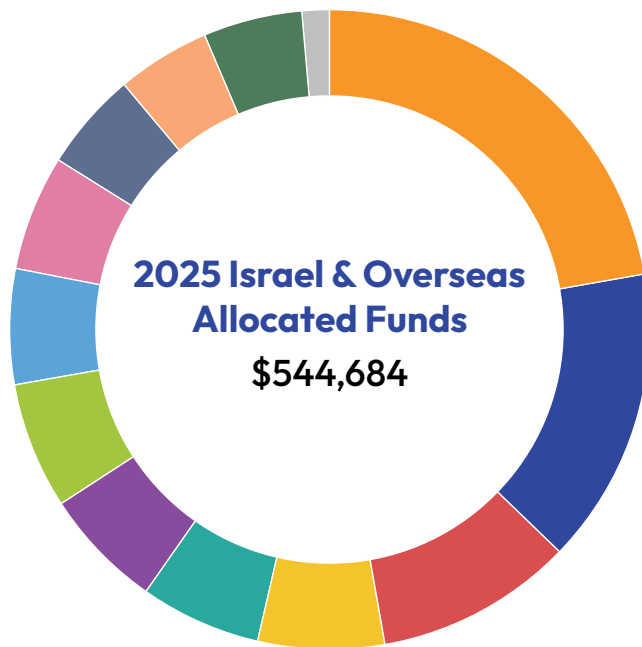

## Building Community through the Passover Story



The Indianapolis Jewish Community Relations Council hosted their annual Passover Seder for the Multifaith Community, which brought together neighbors from across Indianapolis to experience and learn about one of Judaism's most enduring rituals. The afternoon offered community members from different faith backgrounds an opportunity to engage with the story and symbolism of Passover in a welcoming, educational setting.

Led by Rabbi Brett Krichiver from Indianapolis Hebrew Congregation and Rabbi Hal Schevitz from Congregation Beth-El Zedeck, the program guides participants through the key elements of the Seder and the story of the Exodus. The Rabbis walked through the symbolism of the Seder plate, explained the role of questions and storytelling, and discussed the enduring themes of freedom, responsibility, and human dignity that has shaped Jewish memory for thousands of years.

But the purpose of the Passover Seder for the Multifaith Community extended beyond explaining a Jewish holiday. At its core, the program was about relationships.

For many participants, this was their first opportunity to encounter Jewish tradition in such a direct and personal way. Experiencing the ritual together created space for curiosity, conversation, and understanding. When people learn about one another's traditions firsthand, it strengthens the connections that make communities more resilient and more welcoming.

That kind of connection is especially meaningful at a time when antisemitism and religious misunderstanding continue to surface in public life. Creating opportunities for education and dialogue helps ensure that conversations about Jewish identity and history are shaped by relationships rather than misconceptions.

The Passover Seder itself carries a timeless message. Each year, Jews gather to retell the story of the Exodus and reflect on the responsibility that comes with freedom. Sharing that story with friends and neighbors from across the community reflects the spirit of the holiday itself; a reminder that the pursuit of justice, dignity, and understanding is something that brings people together.

## Where Passion Meets Learning: HHAI's Interdisciplinary Approach

Each Thursday morning, a small group of Oak/Pre-K students gathers for an hour of deep, joyful learning through Preschool Passion Projects, individualized projects inspired by each child's own interests. With dedicated guidance from Ms. Mahern and Ms. Maria, the children plan, design, and create projects entirely their own, from racecar design and stop-motion films to butterfly dioramas, princess storybooks, cardboard castles, and fashion designs.

Over three months, the students worked diligently, problem-solving challenges like car wheels that wouldn't roll, exploring new techniques in stop-motion filmmaking, and preparing for a special showcase to share their work with families. The classroom buzzed with curiosity, creativity, and focus as children led their own learning, with teachers supporting and expanding their ideas.

This approach reflects how learning works across HHAI, from preschool through 8th grade. Students benefit from an interdisciplinary model in which the technology

teacher, librarian, head of school, and classroom teachers all contribute their expertise. Students are encouraged to connect subjects, explore their passions, and deepen understanding through hands-on experiences. Just as in the Passion Projects, older students engage in project-based learning, STEAM challenges, and collaborative explorations that foster creativity, critical thinking, and a lifelong love of learning.

This spirit of innovation continues to grow across the school. This spring, HHAI celebrated the opening of the Maya Shmoel Innovation Lab, a new STEAM learning space that integrates science, technology, engineering, art, and mathematics with a strong Israeli influence. The lab was designed with input from teachers across departments as well as students themselves, reflecting the same philosophy seen in the Passion Projects: when learners help shape the process, their curiosity and engagement flourish.

HHAI believes that curiosity drives learning. From preschool to 8th grade, children are empowered to ask questions, pursue interests, and turn ideas into tangible creations, building the skills and confidence they will carry into every area of life. The Passion Projects showcase is more than an early childhood initiative; it is a glimpse into the whole-school culture of curiosity, exploration, and joyful learning.
