We raised more money this year to support our mission at home and in Israel than we have in any of our 63-year history - \$2,125,790. We could not have done this without your trust and support. For that, we are grateful.

We hope you will take a few moments to read about the work we steadfastly do to build, support, and protect the Jewish community. We think you will be as proud as we are of the accomplishments of your Federation. None of this happens without you.

# About Federation

## **Our Mission**

The mission of the Jewish Federation of West-Central New Jersey is to invest in Jewish life by building, supporting, and safeguarding Jewish communities locally, in Israel, and around the world.

## **Statement of Nonprofit Status**

The Jewish Federation of West-Central New Jersey is a nondenominational 501(c)(3) nonprofit offering services to individuals locally and around the world without regard to faith. All services are open and accessible to the entire community. The IRS does not consider JFedWCNJ to be a religious organization.

## **Our Governance**

A Board of Directors governs our Federation. Elected each year at our Annual Meeting, these volunteers include many of our most active supporters and leaders in our community.

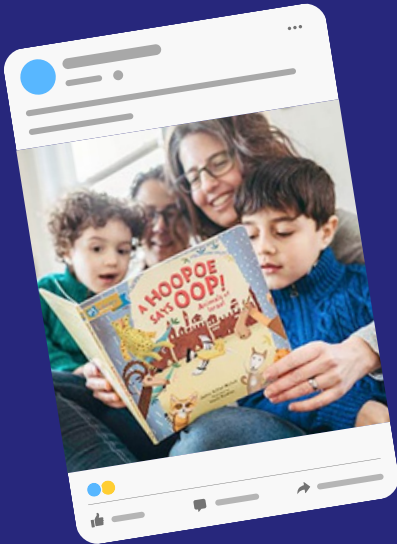
## **Beyond Fundraising**

While our main mission is to raise funds for the community's most pressing needs, we also offer educational and social events, business-networking opportunities, and special programs to build and strengthen our community.

# Our Local Impact

## Shimon & Sara Birnbaum Jewish Community Center - \$59,600

The SSBJCC provides quality programs and services to meet the needs of the Jewish and general communities.



### PJ Library - \$14,600

349 young families subscribe to PJ Library, a free monthly delivery of Jewish-themed books, bringing values & holidays into homes - Federation has invested in this program to ensure every eligible family in our community can participate.

### JCC Security - \$25,000

Securing the safety of everyone who comes to the JCC - from gym members to pre-school students, summer campers, program participants, staff, and guests - is of utmost importance to us.

### Camp Ruach Security - \$10,000

Our Federation successfully applied for a security grant through the Tepper Foundation. The purpose of the grant was to fund extra security personnel for programs involving children aged 0-5. As a result, Federation awarded \$10,000 to the JCC to increase security at Camp Ruach.

### Learning is For Everyone - \$5,000

Learning Is for Everyone, our community's award-winning Jewish adult education series features nationally and internationally acclaimed speakers, authors, scholars, film series, as well as classes taught by local rabbis and synagogue professional staff. Jewish LIFE is supported by the Jewish Federation of West-Central New Jersey, Shimon and Sara Birnbaum Jewish Community Center, Jewish Family Service of Somerset, Hunterdon and Warren Counties and 10 area synagogues

### Special Needs Recreation & Social Programming - \$5,000

38 adults with autism and developmental disabilities participate in social and recreational opportunities through JCares. JCares is meaningful, structured programming that promotes feelings of independence and value.

# Our Local Impact

## Dignity Grows - \$14,575

### About Dignity Grows

Dignity Grows empowers our neighbors in need by providing menstrual and hygiene supplies through partnerships with local non-profits. We remove obstacles to better self-esteem and health by providing personal hygiene essentials.

Dignity Grows mobilizes volunteers to organize, assemble, and distribute free, reusable zipper-top totes filled with a month's supply of soap, shampoo, deodorant, toothbrush and toothpaste, along with menstrual products. Federal grant programs don't cover these items, and people often don't think to donate them to food pantries.

These bags are life-changing for the recipients, giving them a sense of self-respect and self-worth. Women, girls, and all menstruators gain confidence and thrive when they can engage in daily activities without worrying about their periods.

### Our Work

The Jewish Federation of West-Central New Jersey had three distribution partners in 2024, with a goal of adding additional partners in the years ahead. Our current partners are: Jewish Family Service of Somerset, Hunterdon and Warren Counties, Food Bank Network of Somerset County and Flemington Area Food Pantry.

### 900 Bags Packed

We are proud to have packed 900 bags in 2024! No one in our community should have to feel shame or embarrassment, no student should have to miss school, and no adult should have to miss work because they cannot afford the basic hygiene products needed to live life without interruption.



# Our Local Impact

## Rutgers University Hillel - \$15,000

**Hillel provides opportunities for Jewish students at Rutgers University's New Brunswick campus to deepen their connection to Jewish identity and Jewish community.**

### Jewish Engagement Interns

Over the past year, Hillel has successfully engaged hundreds of new students, particularly those who live on campuses outside of New Brunswick, where Jewish-life resources are minimal. To bridge this gap, Jewish Engagement Interns have played a crucial role in bringing Hillel's programs and resources directly to students on all Rutgers campuses.

In the fall semester of 2023, Hillel introduced a new initiative focused on engaging unaffiliated Greek-life students. This led to the addition of a dedicated Engagement Intern whose primary responsibility is connecting with Jewish members of fraternities and sororities. This targeted approach has opened doors for many students who might not otherwise have engaged with Jewish life, helping them find community and support within Hillel.



### Shabbat Dinners

Each Friday, over 300 students, including many from our community, come together to celebrate Shabbat in a warm, welcoming environment. These weekly dinners foster a sense of connection and tradition, providing students with an opportunity to gather, share a meal, and reflect on the week.

Thanks to generous funding from our Federation, these dinners are free of charge to the students.

# Our Local Impact

## Institute for Holocaust & Genocide Studies at Raritan Valley Community College - \$10,460

**The Institute promotes awareness, understanding, and compassion for the suffering of others, shares lessons learned from the Holocaust, serves as a repository of resources, evokes reflection and remembrance, and encourages social action.**

3,740 + students of all ages heard firsthand accounts from Survivors through the Institute for Holocaust & Genocide Studies at RVCC.



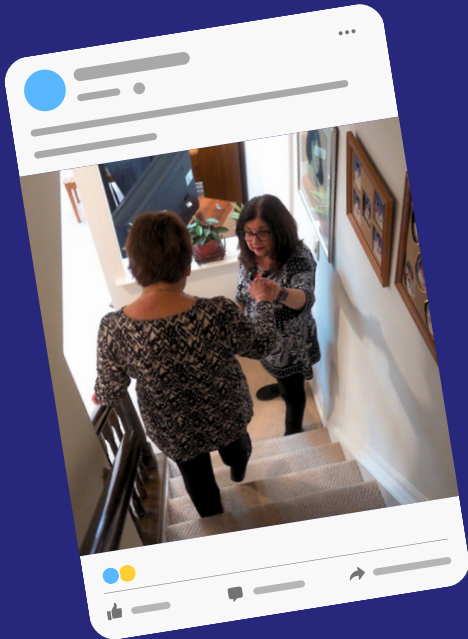
Institute for Holocaust & Genocide Studies successfully organized and facilitated 30+ programs in 2024 aimed at educating and engaging the community on the vital issues of Holocaust and genocide awareness. These programs reached a diverse audience, from students and educators to community members, fostering deeper understanding, reflection, and action around the importance of preserving human rights and combating intolerance.

# Our Local Impact

## Jewish Family Service of Somerset, Hunterdon and Warren Counties - \$236,217

JFS is a non-profit social service agency committed to enhancing the well-being of individuals and families across our tri-county community. Rooted in Jewish values, JFS is dedicated to supporting people of all faiths and beliefs by promoting a strong, inclusive culture that is rooted in integrity, reliability, humility, gratitude, hope, inclusion, renewal, and service. These core values guide its work as the agency strives to preserve and strengthen the quality of life for the clients they serve.



### General Program Funding - \$92,500

Annually, JFS is able to meet the needs of over 2,000 of its most vulnerable clients through essential programs - such as mental health counseling, family mentoring, career services and emergency services.

250 + homebound seniors benefit from regular visits by JFS Senior Shopping volunteers, as well as geriatric assessments, homecare and case management services. These services ensure that seniors not only receive the care they need from JFS but also have the support to combat loneliness and maintain meaningful connections allowing them to age in place and remain part of the community.

Holocaust Survivors receive lifesaving and quality-of-life enhancing services from JFS every day, ensuring their dignity, safety, and well-being. These services range from personalized homecare and trauma-informed mental health counseling to comprehensive case management, as well as meaningful opportunities for social connections and the ability to foster a sense of community and belonging.

# Our Local Impact

## Jewish Family Service of Somerset, Hunterdon and Warren Counties - \$236,217

### Margit Feldman Holocaust Survivors Fund - \$75,000

The Margit Feldman Holocaust Survivors Support Fund is a collaborative project of the Jewish Federation of West-Central New Jersey, Jewish Family Service of Somerset, Hunterdon and Warren Counties, and Kavod/Shef, and is run in partnership with the Seed the Dream Foundation. The fund was established by Jewish Federation of West-Central New Jersey in 2024 to provide critical financial support for Holocaust survivors, and to address their increasing and unmet needs as they age. This initiative aims to surpass the current funding levels from the Claims Conference and state programs.

Our objective is to close the gap in essential support and emergency funding. In each of the next four years, it is anticipated that an additional \$100,000 will be required to meet the needs of more than 50 Holocaust survivors in our community who deserve to age with dignity and comfort.



### NJ State Grant for Senior Nutrition - \$68,717

In partnership with Federations across New Jersey, Jewish Federation of West-Central New Jersey asked Governor Murphy to add \$1,000,000 in funding for kosher senior nutrition programs. The Governor agreed that this is a need that has been unmet in NJ and included our request in his budget. As a result, our Federation received \$68,717 for this purpose. We allocated the funds to JFS, and it was able to serve additional homebound, frail seniors across a larger portion of our tri-county area than ever before.

# Israel & Overseas

## JFedWCNJ Allocated - \$34,100

Federation is able to respond to emergencies the moment they happen, because we are doing the work on the ground before they happen.

### Jewish Agency for Israel - \$5,000

For 90+ years, JAFI has been working to overcome the biggest challenges facing the Jewish people. JAFI founded and built the State of Israel and continues creating links globally, bringing Jews to Israel and Israel to Jews around the world.



### American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee - \$5,000

70 countries are reached by JDC's efforts to build, strengthen, and support the Jewish community across the globe. JDC provides aid to communities in crisis and responds to natural & man-made disasters on behalf of the American Jewish community.

JDC is our global 911.

### Impact Israel (Yemin Orde) - \$21,100

At Yemin Orde Youth Village, 500 at-risk Jewish youth from Israel and all over the world, including Ethiopia, the former Soviet Union, France, Brazil, and Venezuela find a safe haven and are given the education and tools they need in order to succeed.

### World Ort - \$3,000

1,000 hot meals - covering a full school year - are provided to Jewish students attending World ORT Day schools in Kiev, Ukraine.

**Lifeline Services - \$85,733,037**

In a crisis, fundamental needs require immediate attention—giving people time to breathe and process the tragedy. We took swift action to address these pressing needs. These lifeline services included food, clothing, financial assistance, and medicines, as well as spiritual care, such as assistance with funerals and shiva, practical housing solutions, and educational support to evacuated children.

**Medical & Trauma Relief - \$47,801,619**

Addressing the physical, psychological, and emotional wellbeing of affected Israelis is crucial to their recovery. We have supplied hospitals with medical equipment and capacity. We also responded with a proactive approach to mental health and trauma relief including dedicated hotlines, training for caregivers and responders, and ongoing support to emergency teams. We ensured direct care to individuals in need, including first responders, lone soldiers, and families and caregivers coping with the loss, injury, or abduction of their relatives.

**Economic Relief and Recovery - \$42,961,707**

When the attacks forced thousands from their homes, it prompted the closure of businesses nationwide. Families continue to grapple with income loss as reserve soldiers answer the call to duty. Many face an uncertain path to recovery. We are at the forefront of economic relief efforts, having invested in frontline communities and in a significant loan fund for small and medium-size businesses struggling to stay afloat. Our investments in economic relief are designed to create a resilient and flourishing Israeli economy.

**Community Resilience and Rebuilding - \$42,241,173**

In the months and years ahead, we will help enable people to return to their homes and rebuild their communities. We aim to bolster societal resilience so that despite the events of October 7th, we make possible the growth and potential of this generation of Israelis. Our giving will enable substantial investments towards rebuilding and strengthening Israeli society.

**Other - \$100,000**

These funds provide support for communities under fire and for new olim (immigrants) living in absorption centers by helping to pay for evacuations, temporary housing, children's activities, and increased security.



# Community Security

## Tepper Grant - \$50,000

**In the wake of October 7th, it became apparent that Jewish communities around the world needed to further enhance their security. Our community was not any different from communities across the globe who found the steep rise in antisemitism and anti-Zionism threatening. Many organizations began to worry more than usual about the safety of their members and visitors. Much of that focus centered on the vulnerability of children.**

The Jewish Federation of West-Central New Jersey is the proud recipient of a security grant from The Tepper Foundation and Jewish Federations of North America, which will help bolster security at our Jewish early-childhood programs. Building on the success of the LiveSecure initiative, this grant ensures we can protect our youngest community members.

The funds are to be used for hiring security personnel to protect preschools, day camps, and after-school programs. With the help of the Tepper Foundation grant

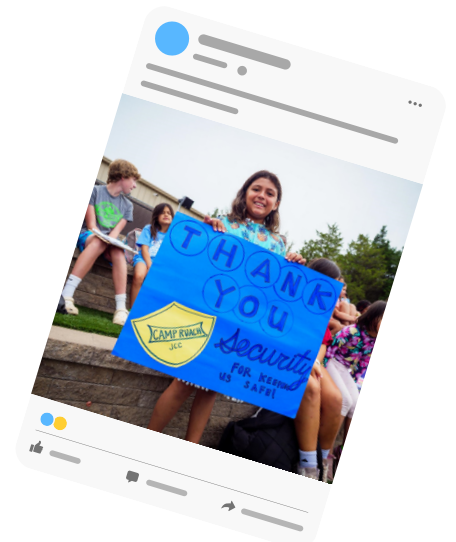

# JFed Security

## JFedWCNJ Allocated - \$60,000

### JFED Security Services

- \*Training of Jewish community partners, organizations, members, and volunteers, including security-related drills
- \*Emergency Operations Planning (EOP), including what to do in the event of a security threat
- \*Evacuation, fire, and lockdown drills to reinforce training
- \*Completion of Threat and Vulnerability Risk Assessments (TVRA) for Jewish organizations and agencies
- \*Assistance with applying for local, state, and/or federal security grants
- \*Relationship-building and connections between local partners and local law enforcement
- \*Access to equipment that is purchased on a regional level and deployed based upon the needs of the community (Examples include portable weapon detection systems and portable vehicle barricades)
- \*Ability to assign guards from our own security force to local synagogues and agencies
- \*Access to all intelligence bulletins and products distributed by the intel analysts assigned to the security force Training Programs
- \*Situational awareness

- \*CPR, AED, and First Aid
- \*De-escalation and Use of Force training for security employees
- \*Access to all SCN online training(s)

### Security Force

All JFed Security employees are retired law enforcement officers who retired in good standing with their respective agencies. Our cadre of 45 current security employees have proudly served Municipal Police Departments, the Department of Corrections, New Jersey State Police, Federal Air Marshal Service, and the Federal Bureau of Investigations. They have held various ranks including Chief of Police, Captain, Lieutenant, Sergeant, Corporal, and Detective.

### Incident Reporting

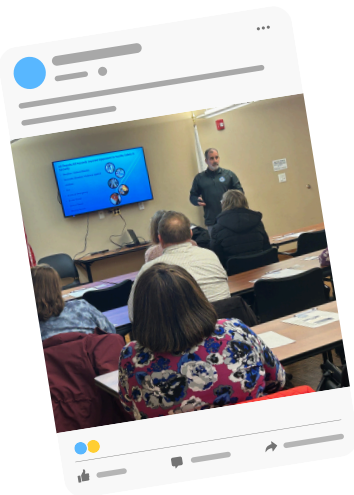
The Incident Reporting Form (IRF) is a standardized online form the public can use to report threats, incidents, or suspicious activity related to Jewish organizations, facilities, or community members. The IRF is a key component of the partnership that exists between Federations and the Secure Community Network (SCN), the official safety and security organization for the Jewish community in North America. The use of the form ensures a coordinated, best-practice approach to incident reporting and follow-up.

### Interfaith Trainings

In December, Federation organized a situational awareness training session to be presented by JFed Security at the Bridgewater Township Building. This important training event brought together members from various faith-based communities, fostering collaboration and enhancing security knowledge across many different groups.

The training focused on equipping participants with essential skills and strategies to stay alert and prepared in potentially dangerous situations. With an emphasis on community safety, the session provided valuable insights into how faith-based organizations can enhance their security measures and ensure the well-being of their members.

By bringing together individuals from diverse faith backgrounds, the event not only promoted safety awareness but also strengthened interfaith relationships, creating a united approach to community security.



# Jewish Community Relations Council

## What is the Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC)?

The Jewish Community Relations Council serves as the central community-relations agency for the organized Jewish community in the tri-county area of Somerset, Hunterdon, and Warren Counties. Its mission is to promote a society rooted in freedom, justice, and democratic pluralism—principles that foster security, equal opportunity, and the creative survival of all groups.

Through its efforts in government relations, Israel advocacy, inter-group relations, and social justice, the JCRC works to shape policies and build relationships that reflect Jewish values and concerns. The Council plays a pivotal role in advocating for a broad range of public policy issues, representing the collective interests of the Jewish community to local, state, and federal policymakers, as well as to civic leaders, media, and interfaith communities.

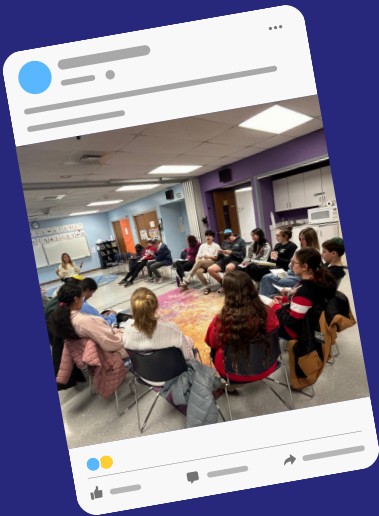
On behalf of the Federation's agencies, organizations, and synagogues, the JCRC determines consensus on critical issues and ensures these concerns are heard across various platforms. Additionally, the Council coordinates programs aimed at raising awareness and mobilizing advocacy around both domestic and international priority issues affecting the Jewish community and the broader society.

## 2024 was another busy and impactful year for our Jewish Community Relations Council. We organized several key events and initiatives to advocate for our community and address critical issues.

This year, we hosted candidate forums for both Congress and Senate, providing a platform for voters to engage with those running for office and to discuss important policy matters. Additionally, we held our second annual Call to Action, a vital conversation focused on tackling the rise of antisemitism in our schools.

Our advocacy efforts extended to ensuring the safety of Jewish communities on college campuses, in schools, and across Jewish institutions. We worked tirelessly to secure nonprofit security grants both at the state level and through federal channels to bolster protection for these communities.

A significant priority was urging the State of New Jersey to adopt the IHRA definition of antisemitism, and we continue to push for progress on this front. We also remained deeply committed to supporting our seniors and Holocaust survivors, advocating on their behalf to meet their unique needs and ensure they receive the care and resources they deserve.



# October 7th - One Year Later

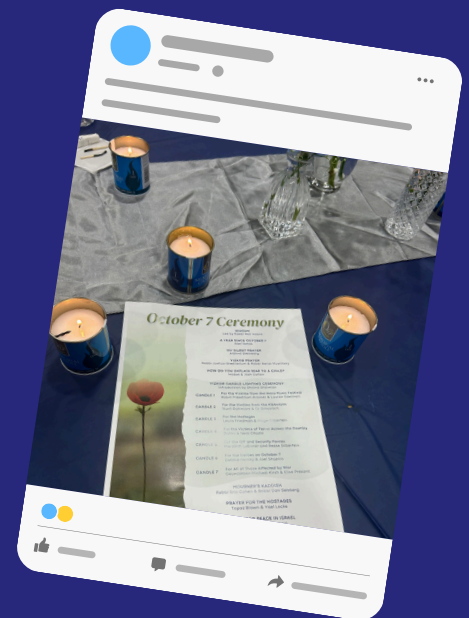
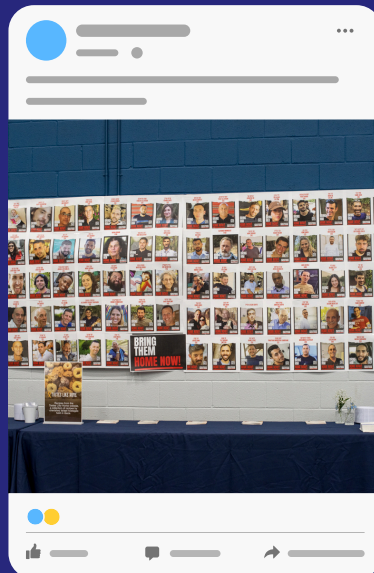
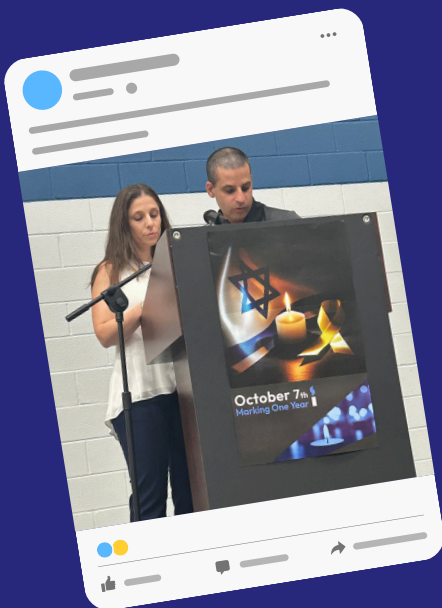
**On October 7, 2024, our community united to mark one of the darkest days in Jewish history since the Holocaust. The commemoration took place in three parts:**

First, we gathered for a screening of the film “Supernova,” a documentary about the events that took place at the Nova music festival. Attendees watched actual footage taken by victims. Together, we processed and reflected on the film’s powerful message.

Second, during a program titled “Tastes Like Home,” community members baked traditional Israeli desserts using recipes supplied by the families of the hostages held in Gaza. These meaningful treats were then served at our community’s October 7<sup>th</sup> commemoration the following day.

Finally, on the anniversary of the tragic attack on Israel, more than 300 community members came together in solidarity to reflect, mourn, and commemorate all that happened on that tragic day in 2023.

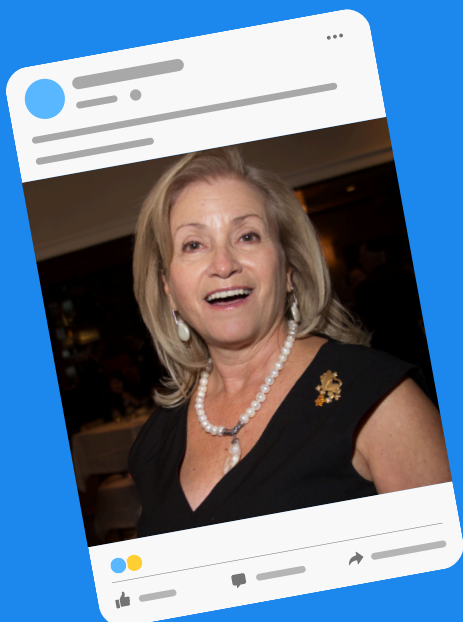

Elaine always led with her signature grace and style. Her calm exterior belied her determination and will to do everything she could to make sure her community thrived.

Her passion for Israel was apparent to anyone who knew her, and she applied herself to supporting the needs of Israel and Israelis in any way she could. It was on that trip that Elaine learned all that our Federation does to aid those in need locally and in Israel. Elaine often said that mission filled her with joy and impressed her so much that she threw herself into volunteering for Federation, eventually joining the Board.

We cannot overstate the impact of Elaine’s leadership on our organization. She began by co-chairing the Missions Committee and was a co-founder of the Women’s Philanthropy division. Through Women’s Philanthropy, hundreds of women became engaged in the mission of Federation and found their own independent philanthropic voices. Elaine finally served as President of the Board of Directors, leading the organization to new heights, building bridges and creating new initiatives.

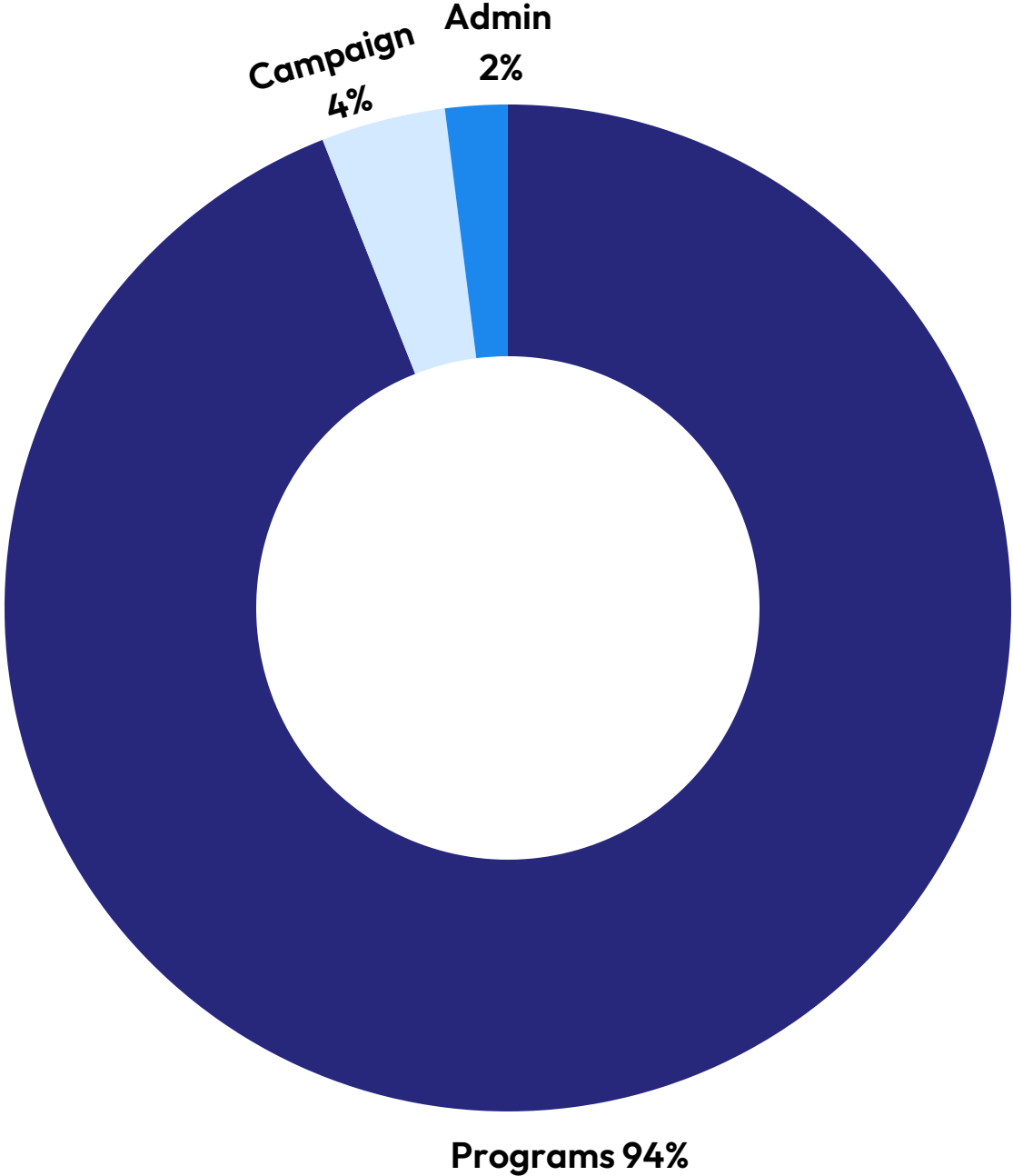
**In 2024, Women's Philanthropy hosted two impactful events that brought together our community and supported our mission.**

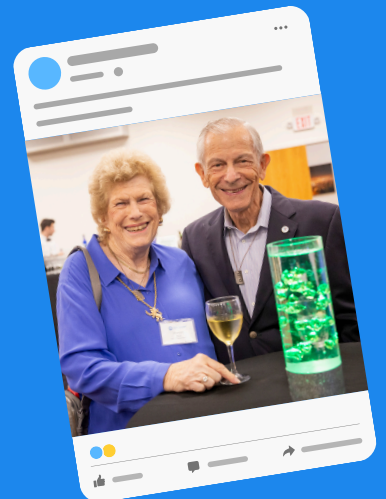
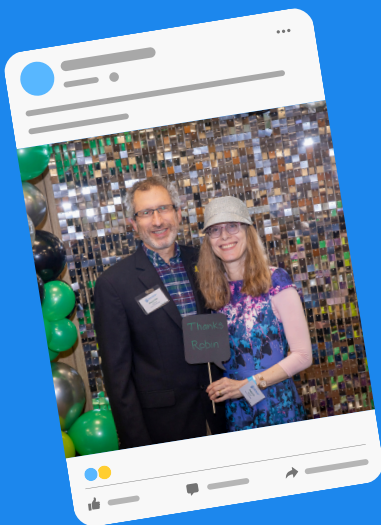
