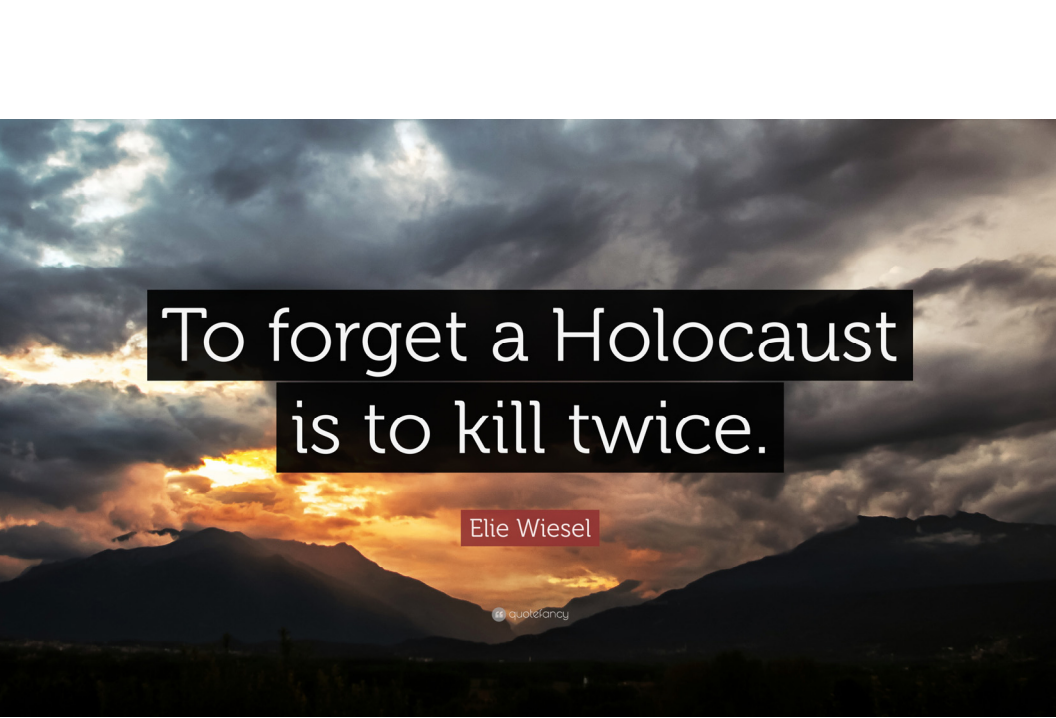

Germany Today, Facing the Past, and the Future of Memory

Learn about the efforts Germany and Bavaria have made during the past six decades to come to terms with the Holocaust, and how the subject can be taught in today's high school and university classrooms during a panel discussion with Professor Dr. Matthias Stickler the Julius-Maximilians-University of Würzburg, Dr. Stefanie Pilzweiger-Steiner, of the Dachau Concentration Camp Memorial Site, and Dr. Robert Sigel of the Bavarian State Government Office of the Commissioner on Jewish Life and Combatting Antisemitism, for Remembrance, and Historical Heritage. The panel will be moderated by Edward Serotta, director of the Vienna-based Jewish historical institute, Centropa.
